Medicare Deadline; Enroll By March 31

"The benefits of Medicare are available to people over 65, but only if they sign up for them," Eino J. Heino, district manager of the Pontiac Social Security office warned today. "And there are some people who are facing a final deadline on Medicare."

Because the law provides only four chances to sign up for full Medicare protection, anyone in Oakland county who will be age 68 before September of this year has only this last chance to sign up and that enrollment period ends March 31.

Social Security offices throughout the country are making every effort to contact people over 65 about signing up for the program. "These efforts have gone on each year since Medicare started so that everybody will be able to exercise their right to say either 'yes' or 'no' to the coverage," Heino said.

"We have found in the past that many people who did not sign up for Medicare when they were 65, changed their minds and signed up during the next enrollment period."

Freedom of speech, press and assembly will be the topic of discussion at the monthly meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club. The meeting is scheduled for 8:30 p.m. March 5 in the community room of First Farmington Savings, Grand River and Orchard Lake Rds., across from Farmington Plaza.

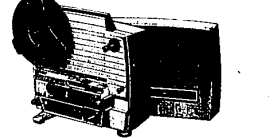
A resolution to be presented to the meeting charges the Nixon Administration, "led by the vice president and attorney general, has entered into a calculated and systematic attack upon the voices of dissent in the land."

The resolution calls for a national day of mourning "to protest the loss of our constitutional liberties." Among developments cited in the resolution as infringing on constitutional rights are "the intimidation and threats to the communication media by Vice President Agnew and the use of subpoena powers to obtain privileged records from newspapers and television and radio regarding militant groups."

The meeting is open to all area residents and all who attend are invited to participate in the discussion, according to club chairman Al Sipher.
