Rabbi eyes new temple for ultra-orthader sect

Congregation Bais Chabad will serve about 35 families who live in the imme-diate neighborhood. The proposed one-story, 2,600-square-foot temple on less than an arce of land is zoned single-family residential.

Tamity restorata. Special-use approval is needed be-fore the temple can be built. The town-ship planning commission set July 14 for a public hearing on the matter. Township assistant planning director Thomas Bird sees no problem with granting approval. The only concern is the activity:

Silbergberg, interviewed at the Lu-buvaitich Center in Farmington Hills, says his sect is a branch of the Chassi-dic movement founded in Russia 250

Habbi Silberberg has lived in West Bloomfield for six years since leaving the Bronx in New York. He has a wife and four children. They are expecting their fifth child.
