

Wittus whips foe at Wimbledon

Basketball may be his first love, but tennis has become Craig Wittus livelihood. Wittus, a 1975 Bloomfield Hills Andover gradu-ate and an Observer & Eccentric All-Area first team selection during his prey days, experienced a tennis players' dream last week at Wimbledon, Evolund.

Playing on the grass courts in the prestigious ten-nis tournament overseas, Witts surprised every-one with a first-round victory in singles competi-tion. He defeated fellow American Eddie Edwards in Straight sets, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4, Monday. Edwards was ranked 98th in the world prior to the match with Witts.

The was defeated in the second round by Bid Drewitt of Australia, 4-5, 6-4, 6-5, Thursday. Wittsis finally realized he had played in the world's biggest professional tennis event after his sethack.

world's biggest professional tennis event after his setback. "It didn't really hit me that I was her until to day," said wlittus from his London flat late Thur-day night. It was kind of surprising that I wasn't really nervous during the first round. I played loose and played well, but I didn't play well at all today (Thursday)."

AS A COLLEGE freshman, Wittus played junior varsity basketball, his first love, at Miami. He was ready to play varsity basketball after leading the JV in scoring, but ended up quitting basketball to pursue tennis, which turned out to be a wise deci-

sion.

As a junior, he was awarded All-American status by making it to the quarterfinals in the NCAA tournamen. He was the first All-American tennis player in the history of the school.

Wittia' mother, Marilyn Wittus, agreed with Craig's decision and sald she wan't surprised that her son made it all the way to England with the likes of Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe and Jimmy Con-

nors.
"But then again, I'm his mother and all mothers would like to think their son could do that. Although I am a little surprised he did it this year. I knew it

would have come next year," she said.
Wittus was invited to Wimbledon when his world
ranking was brought down from 151 to 140 after his
strong showings in a South African tournament,
Forest Hills, NY, and then the French Open.
Despite the tournament experience for Wittus,
Wimbledon still is the ultimate tennis player's
dream.

"THE FRENCH OPEN was pretty good," said Wittus, "but Wimbledon is everyone's dream. I could have done better, but it is just a thrill to even be here."
