FELECIA AMBROSIA (senior): A converted outfielder, Ambrosia compiled a 7-6 pitching record and 85 strike outs for Southfield. She batted .324, including a team-leading four home runs and 32 RBIs. Ambrosia was the team's most valuable player, and has been a Southeastern Michigan Association all star the last two years.

JANA BARINGER (junior): Baringer had 21 RBIs — an average of one per game — and a .354 batting average. The strong-armed third baseman was West Bloomfield's most valuable player and selected to the Greater Oakland Activities League all-star team.

SUE MANNING (sophomore): A switch hitter, Manning averaged .316 and was a unanimous choice as Lahser's most valuable player. Manning also was selected to the Metro Suburban Activities Association all-star team. Manning plays basketball and volleyball for the Knights.

MONIQUE MANSOURA (senior): Mansoura rebounded from a pre-season thumb injury to become Southfield-Lathrup's best pitcher. A converted infielder, Mansoura allowed only 40 earned runs and 43 walks in 101 innings. Her ERA was 2.77. Mansoura batted .288, scored 16 runs and led the team with 21 walks.

COLLEEN MCGOVERN (junior): McGovern compiled an 11-7 overall record for Groves, including a fine 1.69 ERA. She struck out 124 batters in 120 innings, and walked 56. McGovern, who also lettered in volleyball and swimming, was a unanimous Metro Suburban Activities Association

(MSAA) all star.

LORI RICHARDS (senior): Richards combined with a teammate to hurl one no-hitter, and she logged three one-hitters on her way to a 10-3 record for Athens. An all MSAA selection, Richards had 102 strike outs and a commendable 1.31 ERA. She struck out 10 or more batters four times this season. Richards hit .333.

NANCY SETECERRI (senior): Setecerrri, Southfield's leadoff batter, led Blue Jays with a .419 average. Selected to the MSAA all star teams the past two years, Setecerrri was a three-year starter at shortstop. She had 15 RBIs.

MERI STOCKWELL (senior): Mercy's Stockwell pitched 154 innings, striking out 133 and compiling a 13-5 overall record. Stockwell was Mercy's most valuable player. She hit .281, including eight doubles and one triple. Stockwell was a Catholic league all star. She will attend Oakland Community College this fall.

RICH ROY — COACH (Farmington): Roy led Farmington to a share of the Inter-Lakes League title with perennially tough Waterford. Farmington, the Observer & Eccentric's No. 1 ranked team this year, finished with an 11-5 overall record. The Falcons had a 9-1 league mark. Ironically, Roy, the Falcons' ex-baseball coach, was honored as the O & E's baseball coach of the year in 1971.

After being invited, Wittus had to win three qualifying matches before playing in the first round of the tourney.

"I'm getting a lot of confidence," he said, "It feels good. I'm starting to be recognized and respected by my peers."

"This has given me a lot of incentive. I'll be playing a lot in the states this summer."

Wittus, 24, graduated in 1979 from Miami and turned pro right away, but his climb up the rankings was marred by an unfortunate accident last year. He badly sprained his ankle while playing in a basketball game with some friends just before he was supposed to make a trip to a tennis tournament in South Africa.

"It was very unfortunate," said Mrs. Wittus, "because it slowed him up a lot. It set him back in his playing about six months and he just started to get it back together last September."

"I JUST STARTED coming on in the last few months," said Wittus, whose Wimbledon doubles partner is Ian Harris. Harris teaches tennis at the Franklin Racquet Club in Southfield.

As of Thursday, Wittus and Harris had yet to compete in doubles competition because of rain delays.

Wittus started playing when he was 6. He liked tennis, but basketball always came first, according to his mother.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 22, 1981

Farmington Hills City Council held a regular meeting on June 22, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock p.m. Members present were Burwell, Sorensen, Wolf, Alkateeb, Lange and Dolan. Oppenheimer absent. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns, City Attorney Bibeau and Assistant City Manager Costick.

Council approved the minutes of June 1 and June 8, 1981.

A necessity was declared for water improvement for Northwestern Highway from Inkster Road to Lot 163 of Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms No. 1 and set the date for a cost public hearing for July 20, 1981.

Council determined the main structure and chicken house be demolished and other buildings be secured at 21117 Tuck Road.

Council determined the buildings or structures to be dangerous buildings located at 21334 Rockwell and should be demolished.

Zoning Map Amendment C62-253 parcel 23-15-101-029 located between Twelve Mile and I-696, south of the Post Office and Library to be rezoned from OS-1 to OS-1A, was enacted.

Zoning Map Amendment C62-254 parcel 23-36-101-401 located on the Southeast corner of Middlebelt and Nine Mile intersection to be rezoned from B-1 to B-3 was enacted.

Zoning Map Amendment C62-256 was enacted rezoning 23-13-101-401 from RA-2 to B-2 and OS-1 located on the Southeast corner of Middlebelt and Twelve Mile intersection.

Executive session was called to consider pending litigation.

Council accepted the report on Adult Foster Care Facilities and determined to appoint a study committee, and a resolution be prepared re: loss of local control, addressed to Legislators.

Council accepted the report on 911 Emergency System and instructed the administration to proceed with the project.

Approval was given Franklin Hills Country Club for the 4th of July fireworks display permit.

Council approved the easement agreement with owner of lot 179 of Old Homestead Subdivision for sanitary sewer.

Approval was given repayment to A.J. Mackey re: transmission main from 12" to 16" in Section 6, Country Ridge Subdivision.

A special assessment district was established for sewer improvement on Greening from Burbank to Thirteen Mile Road.

Council approved Insurance for Farmington Founders Festival fireworks display. Helen Cope and Arthur Heidt were appointed to the Commission on Aging.

A special assessment district for paving of Fourteen Mile Road from Ten Hill to Inkster Road South was established and the Necessity Public Hearing was set for July 20, 1981.

Council adopted a resolution recommending passage of Senate Bill No. 248.

A special assessment district for paving Nine Mile Road between Power and Freedom Roads was established and the Necessity Hearing date set for July 20, 1981.

Traffic Control Order prohibiting parking on the north and south side of Botswick Avenue west of Flanders Drive between the hours of 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. was adopted.

The contract for the annual weed cutting program was awarded to PAR Company. parcels of land involved will be assessed on the next tax roll.

Upon motion meeting adjourned.
