UNDER THE NEW program, most students will take English I and II at the ninth-grade level, moving on to English III and IV in the 10th grade, followed by a full year of American lit-crature erature.

Farture of a total year of anticide into Superior students will be able to waive English I and II, moving into the second year of program in the ninth grade, thereby becoming eligible sooner to pick from a list of 10 elec-tives by the junior year. Electives would include the school newspaper, yearbook, humanilies, advanced com-position, grammar, stagecraft and play production (summer offering only). Provisions have also been made for the student in need of remedial help.

That student can take the entire four years to fulfill the English major by taking a basic year of reading and writ-ing before moving into English I and II. "The change will serve to unify the program. Everybody will be doing the same thing. They'l all have a kernel to build on," Mrs. Vickery said.
