

If your income for 1980 did not exceed \$10,000 and you are a paraplepic, quadriplegic, senior citizen, eligible serviceman, eligible veteran, eligible widow, biland or totally or permanently disabled, your application must be field with the City of Farmington Hills Treasurer's Office no later than September 15, 1981. Sammer taxes that are deferred will be payable along with winter taxes no later than Monday, February 15, 1982.
