

Mixed team captures championship in bowling

For the first time in the history of the Champion of Champions tournament, sponsored by the Bowling Proprietors Association, a mixed team captured the top prize of \$15,000 and became unofficially the champion of all league teams in the Detroit area.

The Olympic Planes, captained by Althena Kiplias, registered a 2471-824 - 3095, to win the title last Saturday night at the Thunderbowl in Allen Park.

The team, which bowls out of Cloverlanes in Livonia, had a season average of 753 and rolled games of 801, 810 and 860 and now must await the official figuring of averages before the triumph can become official.

Second place and a prize of \$7,500, goes, unofficially of course, to the Ding-A-Ling team from Bowcraft Lanes with a count of 3065. It was captained by Jerry Daschke. Third place and a prize of \$5,000 goes to the Kosida Office Supply team from the Mixed League at Beacon Recreation, with a 3050 total.

The competition was the most exciting in years, as 58 of the 61 eligible teams, bowling at the same time across 58 lanes, drew the largest gathering ever to witness the finals and the scores were closer than ever. And it was the first time that teams from the Detroit east side ever were shut out from the top three places.

THERE WILL BE no shortage of bowlers, but a lot of new faces, when the all-star leagues open their season during Labor Day week.

Many of the regulars, because of the economy, are reducing the number of nights a week they plan to bowl. This is opening the way for the newcomers who have been eyeing all-star spots for several seasons.

They will make their debut in the John Gavis Sweepstakes, which begins competition at Sunnysbrook Lanes during the final week of August.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS
SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS
CITY COUNCIL MEETING
JULY 20, 1981
7:30 P.M.

Farmington Hills City Council held a special meeting on July 20, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock p.m. Members present were Burwell, Soronen, Oppenhausser, Wolf, Alkatech, Lange and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns, City Attorney Bibeau and Assistant City Manager Costick.

Zoning Map Amendment C62-257 was denied to rezone lots 5 and 6 of Westmont Subdivision located on the south side of Thirteen Mile Road and east of Middlebelt, from RA-1 to OS-1 or OS-1A, OS-3.

Introduction was made to zoning map Amendment C62-258, parcels 23-11-477-012, 015 and 016 located on the NW corner of Middlebelt-Twelve Mile intersection to rezone from B-1 and RA-1 to B-2.

Zoning map Amendment C62-259, lot 50 of Supervisor's Plat of Woodcrest Farms No. 1 to rezone from RA-1A to OS-1 or OS-3 was adjourned for one month.

Zoning text amendment C62-LL, Section 100A to regulate the building length and distance between buildings in OS-3 and Section 2003, Height Limit, to provide and regulate the location of copulas in OS-1, OS-1A and OS-2 was introduced.

Cluster Housing Site Plan No. 58-3-81 in the SW 1/4 of Section 30, part of parcel 23-30-300-027, north of Nine Mile Road east of I-275 Expressway, with 16 units was approved subject to the escrow deposit for landscaping and planting, open space agreement and completion date of October 18, 1983.

Council postponed and rescheduled the necessity hearing and set the cost hearing for August 17, 1981 for the paving of Fortteen Hills from Ten Hill to Inkster Road.

Council approved the Notice of Intent to issue bonds for water improvement on Northwestern Highway from Inkster to lot 163 of Woodcrest Farms and adjourned the cost hearing to July 27, 1981.

Appointments were made to the Zoning Board of Appeals and the ad hoc Energy Commission.

Upon motion meeting adjourned.
