## Dangerfield triumphs with rapid-fire humor

After weathering some rude fans and a power failure that left him without lights or a microphone at Meadow Brook last Friday, comedian Rodney Dangerfield snapped back with a rapid-fire comedy set of his best caustic humor. True to his trademark phrase, "I don't get no respect," Dangerfield didn't get much of it from a few disgruntled fans who kept hollering that he was talking too fast. He slowed down and so did his jokes. But, eventually, the 60-year-old New Yorker hit his stride and the crowd settled down. Dangerfield gets the biggest laughs from jokes about his wife and his sex life. "I asked a cab driver to take me where I could get a little action... He took me to my house," he told the overflowed crowd. "I know I'm not a sexy guy. When I put my underwear on, I hear the 'Fruit

of the Loom' guys giggling." Dangerfield paced the stage nervously, wiping his brow, pulling on his tie, and occasionally inviting questions from the audience. Heckling him is risky, as the guy who asked Dangerfield what he did for a living found out. "I get guys for your sister," Dangerfield shot back. Meadow Brook is probably too large for Dangerfield. He talks extremely fast and some people out on the hill couldn't pick up his material. Dennis Blair, a Dangerfield protege, opened the show for him. He bills himself as musical humorist but does excellent impressions as well. "I start filming a television special in August," Dangerfield said in an interview before the show. "I wrote most of the show, and I will star in it as well."

## second runs Tom Panzenhagen

"Stalag 17" (1953), 11:45 p.m. Saturday on Ch. 7. Originally 120 minutes.

Director Billy Wilder always manages a wonderful blend of comedy and drama in his films. "Stalag 17" and "The Apartment" (1960), for instance, have humorous moments. "Some Like It Hot" (1959) has poignant interludes. Of course, this mixture of elements serves to highlight parts of the whole, develops character, makes us sympathize with characters, and creates a well-balanced, well-paced film. William Holden is the outsider in the P.O.W. camp, Stalag 17, and Robert Strauss and Harvey Lembeck provide comic relief (in the vein of Emmet Kelly's "Weary Willie" clown character). Otto Preminger is excellent as the camp commander. Rating: \$3.60.

Wayne western trilogy ("Fort Apache," 1948, "She Wore a Yellow Ribbon," 1949), should have been the second installment. Whereas "Yellow Ribbon" finds Wayne near retirement, in his closing days as a cavalry officer, "Rio Grande" picks up where "Apache" leaves off. Wayne, formerly second in command to Henry Fonda, is promoted to commandant. "Fort Apache" because of its blunt characterizations and attack on bigotry, is the best of the lot. "Yellow Ribbon" is overly sentimental;

again, "Rio Grande" belongs somewhere in the middle. Maureen O'Hara and Ben Johnson co-star. Rating: \$3.15.

"The Naked Runner" (1967), midnight Monday on Ch. 7. Originally 104 minutes.

Frank Sinatra has made plenty of mediocre films, but a few of his pictures have been very good. Among them is "Naked Runner," a spy thriller that has businessman Sinatra pressed into action as an assassin. The question is, which government has drafted the expert marksman into duty? Rating: \$3.10.

## Eight study jazz at Ford

Eight residents of the western suburbs have been selected to participate in the annual summer jazz studies program at Henry Ford Community College in Dearborn.

The eight are part of a group of 60 students from across the state who were awarded scholarships for the intensive, five-week program.

The students are: Glen Adsit of Canton; Charles Barnard and Daniel Georagievich of Redford; Timothy Kloster of Livonia; Tom Herring of Westland; Martin Stephens of Farmington Hills; and Joseph LaBeau and John Upton of Plymouth.

The scholarship recipients are able to select from a wide variety of music classes, including jazz history, jazz ensemble, jazz theory, arranging and composition, and improvisation. Each student will receive eight hours of college credit upon completion of the program.

The jazz students will perform as a group at 7 p.m. July 29 and 30 in the center courtyard at Henry Ford Community College. The concerts are free.

## Oakland to host lute workshop

More than 100 lute players from this country and abroad will gather at Oakland University Aug. 2-7 for the summer workshop in lute and lute song.

Lute students and professionals will attend the program that includes a series of five concerts by celebrated masters of lute and lute songs.

All concert programs are open to the public. Paul O'Dette, North America's foremost Renaissance lutanist will perform music of Italian masters on Aug. 2. British master of the lute Nigel Fort will present music for the Baroque lute the following day.

Swedish lute virtuoso Jakob Lindberg will play English music from the Golden Age on Aug. 14. Nigel Rogers, a tenor specializing in early music will sing to lute airs played by Paul O'Dette. On Aug. 5, O.U. will present Lutemanny, an extravaganza of voices and lutes.
