YOUTH SOCCER REGISTRATION - Registration continues through Aug. 14 at the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation office for children in kindergarten through fifth grade. Children are placed in one of three divisions within a zoned soccer concept. Games are played on Saturdays beginning Sept. 12. The fee is \$10 per participant.

WRESTLING CAMP - The Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Department is now taking registration for its wrestling camp, to take place at Farmington High School. The camp will offer beginning, intermediate and advanced instruction in proper techniques and appropriate wrestling styles.

The camp is designed for youth in grades 6-12; wrestlers will be placed in appropriate divisions. The camp will be offered in two sessions, this Monday-Friday and Aug. 10-14; the times of each session will be at 9-10:30 a.m. or 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Preregister at the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation office. The fee is \$25 per participant.

Program wins accreditation

Mercy College of Detroit's undergraduate social work program has received accreditation from the Council on Social Work Education.

John McNary, vice president for academic affairs, noted that the council gave "unequivocal" approval to the program, meaning they cited no areas needing improvement. Approval was given for the maximum allowable time, three years, until June 1983.

"The commission commends the program on its well thought out educational objectives appropriate to the community-oriented social service needs," stated commission chairperson Elaine Rothenberg, in a letter to Mercy's president, Agnes Mary Mansour, RSM.

"The commission also notes with appreciation the extensive inclusion of cross-cultural values in the curriculum, with content on aging, ethnicity, sexism and racism."

The newly accredited program leads to a bachelor of arts degree in social work. Courses in this field have been offered since the college's founding in 1941. The social work major was instituted in 1974. The program prepares students for entry level social work practice or entry into graduate school.

Values clarification is an important part of Mercy's program, Sister Agnes Mary observed.

"The importance of values in social work make it essential that values clarification not be left to chance," she stated. "In Mercy's social work program, values and ethical principles compatible with the Judeo-Christian tradition are an integral element in the liberal arts-based curriculum."

Students in the social work program combine classroom instruction with supervised field experience in order to maximize their educational development at the undergraduate level.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on July 20, 1981, at 8:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers, 23500 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Mayor William S. Hartsock, Councilmen A. Bennett, W. Mitchell, R. Tupper and R. Yoder.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Selfert, Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Bushey.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

A Public Hearing was held on the necessity of improving Nine Mile Road. Council adopted resolutions to improve Nine Mile Road from Power Road to Freedom Road, ordered the preparation of the Special Assessment Roll, and established a Public Hearing to review the roll on August 3, 1981.

Council accepted the provisions of the Show Cause Order relative to the pending industrial sewage surcharge.

An expenditure of \$539,72 towards the city's pro rata share of the cost of the Xerox Tax Appeal was authorized by Council.

The closing of Moore Drive for an August 8th Block Party was approved; also the closing of Oakland Street for a September 12th Street Sale.

Council opposed House Bill 4423. They received resolutions pertaining to the release of mentally ill persons and their placement in single family areas.

The bid for the 1981 Sidewalk Replacement Program was awarded to Gaglio Brothers Cement Contractors in the amount of \$82,665.90.

A Special Meeting to review the city's insurance program was scheduled for July 27, 1981.

Council authorized the services of a Special Attorney for 1981 Tax Tribunal Appeals.

Council was advised that the currently pending court case against the City of Farmington has been dismissed.

Council reviewed the Oakland County Solid Waste Management Plan as developed by Camp Dresser & McKee.

Public comments were received.

O. Herbert Henry was appointed to the Farmington Area Arts Commission for a new three-year term.

The Building Department's Annual Report was received and filed.

The monthly bills were approved for payment.

The meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.
