## Lansing has its eyes on Plymouth

The Plymouth Energy Program (PEP) has sent sparks flying in Lansing. The year-old program which informs res-tidents about energy savings in town hall-siyle gatherings recently was selected, in part, as a statewide model, says John Beh-man, PEP coordinator. The program started here last year as a national pilot program with a 42,000 fede-al grant. The state's interest uses Plym-outh's experiences elsewhere.
