Foresee Gill Paving

The City of Farmington plans to spend \$240,000 to pave three roads for its 1970-71 major road construction program.

The major work will see \$100,000 being spent to pave 4,000 feet of Gill Rd. from Grand River to Freedom Dr.

pave 4,000 feet of Gill Rd. from Grand River to Freedom Dr. Another \$60,000 is budgeted for 12,500 feet of Drake from Grand River to the south city limits. The third project will see 2,500 feet of Shiawas-see paved from Farmington Rd. to Grand River for \$60,000. Also, the intersection of Shiawassee and Or-chard Lake will be paved with the city's share being \$20,000 \$20,000.

THE PAVING program has been worked out by City Manager John Dinan and reported to the city council. The council was to approve the plan at its last meeting but delayed action during that prolonged meeting when the hour reached midnight. Dinan is seeking council approval to proceed with engineering plans so bids can be taken during early spring 1971. Dinan expects construction cally the

Dinan expects construction will begin during the summer months of 1971.

New Apartments Find Tenants Virtually all new apartments are rented within nine months after completion, according to a survey by the Census Bu-reau and the Department of Housing and Urban Develop-ment of 332 000 private apart ment of sate of the apart ment of sate of the apartment bit of the apartments were type-bed-room units which rented for \$150-\$200 a month.



THE SCOPE OF the project was made possible by an anticipated increase in state-returned tax rev-enues after completion of the 1970 census.

The city's present \$80,000 gasoline tax return is expected to increase to \$110,000 after April 1, 1970 based on a projected population of 12,000.

The increase not only improves the city's fund-ing for road maintenance but broadens the city's bonding capacity for major road construction.

The city's bonding attorneys (Miller, Canfield, Paddock & Stone) estimated the city will be able to purchase \$260,000 of Motor Vehicle Highway Fund bonds because of the increase in gas tax returns.

However, the city is limited to 45% of its total revenue from the preceding year so it will not be eli-gible to purchase the \$260,000 worth of bonds until after July 1, 1971.
