Back on the other end of the spectrum they are told, "Don't do it." So some don't but never really know why; again, confusion remains. Others do it anyway and fight with the guilt they cannot even admit to themselves.

Perhaps, if the adult world could be educated out of its extremism on the one hand and its double messages on the other hand, we could arrive at a sexual morality that is both loving and responsible.


