though 85 programs were added to girls' high school athletics in Michi-gan in 1978-79, it would take 14 years to catch up with what is now available for boys — even if the amount of boys' programs remained constant.

PEER found that 31 percent of all participants in high school sports are girls, while 69 percent are boys.
At the varsity level, 45 percent of high schools in Michigan were out of compliance with the law in 1979-so
