

Golden Eagles dipped in finals

Birmingham's Golden Eagle fast-pitch softball team capped an outstanding season by finishing second in the class B state championships over the weekend.

The Golden Eagles roared through the tournament with three straight wins, but lost two games to Livonia Daily Racers in the finals. The Livonia team won by scores of 2-0 and 2-1.

"We have nothing to be ashamed of," said Golden Eagle coach Steve Crane. "This was our first year together, and finishing second in the state is pretty good."

"We had a lot of fans up there, and it's (finishing second) nice for the community," he said.

The Golden Eagles were led by

pitcher Colleen McGovern, who is starting her senior year at Birmingham Groves High School. McGovern hurled 32½ innings and posted three shutouts.

In the Golden Eagles' opening game, McGovern pitched a two-hitter to get past Saginaw Kimmel 4-0.

PAT CORFIELD, a Southfield-Lathrup graduate who now attends Michigan State University, hit a key second-inning double that scored Carol Patrick of Seaham with the eventual winning run.

The Golden Eagles then blanked Potosky Manufacturing 3-0.

Missy Thomas led the five-hit Golden Eagle attack with a 2-for-3 performance.

"Carol Patrick scored the winning run and saved the day for us," said Crane. "Their pitcher, Judy Koen, drills a ball to centerfield that looks to be a sure home run all the way. Patrick goes back and makes an over-the-shoulder grab in the second inning which turned the game around."

McGovern hurled 10 more innings of shutout softball against Cheyboygan Spare Time Lanes as the Golden Eagles took the extra-inning game, 1-0.

Karen Crawford opened the bottom of the 10th with a walk, and was bunted to second base. After a walk to Patrick and Mary Pike, Nancy Seteceri hit a game-winning single.
