This affiliation makes it possible for the club to combine efforts with nation-al and international clubs to accom-plish carefully selected projects. The club has formed several departments in the arts, conservation, education, home life, international affairs and public affairs. Each department com-mittee evaluates the needs of the com-

miltee evaluates the needs of the community and may decide either to support existing local projects or implement new projects.

The Farmington Hills club currently is supporting the Bucket Brigade, a one-to-one tutoring program in the public schools, New Horizons, an organization providing training in sheltered workshops for mentally and physically handicapped adults in Oakland County, Sarah Frisher Children's Home, Meals on Wheels, Goodfellows, the Community Library, and Girstown, a home for

Seam Feber Children's Tottle, means on Wheels, Goodellows, the Community Library, and Ciristown, a home for ten-age girls in Belleville. The group also sponsors shoplifting-prevention programs in area schools in cooperation with the local police departments and the county sherlif's department. Besides community service, the club provides, at its monthly meetings, speakers from varied professions. Speakers have discussed such subjects as women's rights in obtaining credit, better TV viewing and alternatives to TV for our children, early detection of breast cancer, and cilizens' efforts to prevent shoplifting.

The club has had workshops to make Christman gifts and centerpieces for 300 handinapped adults of New Horizons, has met several exchange students from Europe and Brazil at an international coffee, and has gone to Channel 78 "Kelly and Co." More programs are scheduled this year to increase personal awareness and broaden members' interests and talents.

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
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
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
