Filar noted that 71 percent of the WLEA membership this year is at the maximum step. That figure is expected to increase to 78 percent in 1982-83 school year if a straight line projection on seniority is applied, she said.

IN FRINGE benefits, the new con-tract calls for an increase in dental benefits and the addition of vision in-surance in the second year.

Also in the second year, the tentative agreement calls for teachers to be paid for half of their accumulated leave days at the rate of substitute teachers' pay upon retirement or resignation.
