Faith church hosts North Park Choir

The North Park College Choir of Chicago will give a concert at 8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 25, in Faith Covenant Church, 35415 W. 14 Mile Road, Farmington Hills. There is no admission charge.

The concert is the first of 12 to be given by the choir during a seven-state eastern tour. David L. Thorburn directs the choir.

Works being performed by the choir during the tour will include "The Heilig (German Sanctus)" by Mendelssohn and the "Mass in G" by Poulenc, as well as selections from the sacred music of Benjamin Britten, Aaron Copland, Howard Hanson and Arnold Schoenberg.

The North Park College Choir enjoys a national reputation. Since 1947, it has participated in annual concerts at Orchestra Hall in Chicago and since 1978 has given similar concerts at Orchestra Hall in Minneapolis. It has made 15 recordings.

Thorburn, the choir's director since 1965, has led 11 tours totaling 75,000 miles, and stretching from coast to coast.

A member of the North Park music faculty since 1963, Thorburn teaches organ and directs the college chorus as well as the choir. He holds degrees from Northwestern University and several years ago was invited to work with

and conduct the San Francisco Symphony Chorus.

The North Park Choir under his direction has performed with Sir Georg Solti and the Chicago Symphony and with the Lyric Opera of Chicago.

North Park College is a four-year liberal arts college with an enrollment of approximately 1,250 students. It is located in a residential area of the city about eight miles northwest of downtown Chicago, providing a traditional campus setting inside a major metropolitan area.

Its music department offers students the opportunity to work with outstanding Chicago-area musicians and to audition for Chicago professional musical organizations. A number have sung with the Chicago Symphony Chorus, and several perform each year with the Civic Orchestra, training orchestra for the symphony.

North Park is owned and operated by the Evangelical Covenant Church of

America. Admission, however, is open to all students. Majors and degrees offered include business administration, computer science, music, nursing and the Swedish language, as well as a full range of other subjects.
