Knack looks strong

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The No. 1 group of 1979 is back stronger than ever to show the world its success wasn't just a fluke. The Rnack, whose debut L.P. 'Get the Rnack, went gold in just 13 days, hay sust released its third vinyl wonder.

Even though the Knack became the critics' darboard, with the buil'seye being the group's career, it still attained No. 1 status with the first single 'My Sharona' from the debut L.P. Most of the songs on this album can be listened to with girlfriends, mothers and even grandmothers. The album contains nine songs available for your mixed-company listening pleasure.

"I THINK we've stretched musically and I think I've grown vocally," said vocalist/guitarist Doug Fieger. "The songs are a little more complex and a little richer in texture."

A song like "Africa" proves that the band has pulled itself out of the rut that it was in. The song doesn't sound like your average pop band. Fieger's voice has a very mystical quality. "Sweet Dreams" shows another side of Fieger's talented personality. One mistake made with the latest at-bum was Capitol's choice for a single. Guitarist Berton Averre's "Pay the beyil" is a good tune but it doesn't have the mass appeal of the second single, "Boys Go Crazy."
"That was not our choice to have Pay the Devil' be the first single," Fieger said. "The band was against releasing that. We were all happy to release 'Boys Go Crazy."

I was an actor at the Vanguard playhouse in Detroit, I was Peter Pan at the Detroit Institute of Arts and I produced 'Waiting for Godot' and 'The Zoo Stdry' at Oak Park High

"I only do things that I believe in from my heart, and the Knack is one of them. It somehow saddens me that people think it's something other than that. If they get a chance to meet us and talk to us, they'll realize that, because you can't fake sincerity."

The group was also criticized for the album title, as being too pushy. "What else would you call a first album?" asked Fieger in self-defense.

"AS FAR AS language in the songs goes, that's the way people talk these days. I don't think you can have a 50s morality in the 80s.
"Rock in roll is supposed to be a reaction to the seriousness of daily life. And also an attempt to enjoy that childlike attitude before we had to get seriousness had be adulted."

The song rose to the No. 1 spot and became the biggest-selling song of 1879. Even though the song was the biggest seller the Knack ever had, it still has more meaning for Feiger.
