## Its restaurants win the Super Bowl of good eating

THEN I THINK of Cincinnati, I don't think about football. I think on musseline of pike, Veal Pierre, or possibly a salmon filet broiled in a copper pan and served on a bed of zucchini.

Cincinnati is one of the most underrated restaurant cities in the United States. Michael E. Comisar, manager of the Malsonette Restaurant, puts it another wav.

"When people think of restaurants, they think of the East Coast, the West Coast and Forda. But does anybody think of Clincinnati?"
They think about it at Rungis, the famous marketplace in Paris, where they pack fresh flah and send it by air every day to the Maisonette. Dover sole, brill, urbot — all stored in the fish drawers of a special ice box, padlocked and ready, just outside the restaurant's wine cellar.

They certainly think about Cincinnati when they pass out the prestigious Mobil restaurant ratings or Holiday Dining Awards. The Maisonette, one of several area restaurants un by the Comissar family, has won a Holiday Daward every year for 29 years. It earns Mobil's coveted five-star dining award, making it the champlon of city restaurants.

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
