## Women on the Go

### Her Tragedy Means Service For Others

For many women, having two retarded children would spell bitterness and defeatism. For Mrs. John Moore of Redford Township, it has pointed the way to service and help of many retarded children and their parents.

"I feel my husband and I have solved our problem," Barbara Moore said. "But I'm concerned for other parents who still must find a way to accept theirs."

And because of her efforts in this field, Mrs. Moore wears a "heart of gold" pendant awarded to her recently through the Women for United Foundations organization.

BARBARA'S EARNING of that award goes back 16 years to the day when the Moore's first child, a son, John, was born.

His parents went the familiar route of not realizing at first that anything was wrong and finally suspecting, checking and accepting his retardation.

"We needed some place to go for help then," Barbara recalls. "That was when we joined the Detroit Association for Retarded Children. We were helped most by the interviews we had with other parents who had faced the same problem and could help us decide the best thing to do."

Johnny was 4½ when his parents placed him in the Caro State Home. By this time they had a normal two-year-old, Steven.

THEN, 10 YEARS ago, the Moores had a beautiful baby girl Karen. When she was a few months old her parents again noted the signs of retardation.

Karen's lack of development stemmed from PKU, a deficiency disease that can be corrected if detected at birth. Today all babies born in Michigan are checked as a matter of routine.

Karen was five when the test was made, though her mother had suggested it earlier.

She stayed home with her parents and Steven until 3½ years ago when a new set-up in the Maullay hall of the Plymouth State Home and Training School interested the family in placing her there.

"I was managing with her at home," Barbara said in retrospect,

... "but she'd whine all day long and I realized later it was getting to me. And it seemed fairer to Steven to place her in the home."

"As her ward is organized, there are separate rooms for the little girls there and a common lounge-type room. Thus there's a place where a child who is crying or having difficulty can be separated from the others."

"We bring Karen home every Sunday and sometimes bring another child from the home along too. We know she'll never be better, but she's adjusting."

BARBARA MOORE joined the Caro Parents Association after her son was committed there, and has continued to give some service to the group—like collecting clothing for the patients—though Johnny died several years ago.

She is ward mother for the 26 little girls in Karen's ward, planning birthday parties for them and taking care of seasonal decorations and parties.

"I try to help with the children there in any way I can," she said. "Only eight of those little girls ever see any of their families or go home to visit."

She also joined and held office in the Redford Association for Retarded Children, which became the Northwest Communities Association for Retarded Children and serves Redford, Livonia, Garden City, Plymouth and Northville. In addition, Barbara is active in the National Association for Retarded Children.

FOUR YEARS ago, after Karen went to the Plymouth State Home, Barbara joined the Redford Suburban League

because of its many services to the retarded in this area.

"I've enjoyed the social contacts too," said Mrs. Moore, who now serves as philanthropic chairman for the RSL.

It was the CSL that nominated Barbara Moore for her "heart of gold" award, and she says she accepted it on its behalf. "There are so many hearts of gold in that group," she said.

Barbara Moore also has spearheaded many projects to fund programs that benefit the retarded but are not state supported.

These included securing needed equipment, providing scholarships for special education teachers, encouraging more research and testing and developing summer camps and pre-school nurseries for the retarded.

"I've found so many people who want to help when I begin some new project," she said.

BARBARA is interested in many more possibilities of help for the retarded—like some sort of residential building where mildly retarded adults could live while going out to daily jobs.

"I'd like to do more to help the parents of the borderline retardation cases accept their situations," she said. "In many ways it's hardest for them."

With all her activities and those of a busy junior high son and a businessman husband, Barbara agrees she puts in "very full days."

"But I'm never bored," she added, "and I don't see why any woman should be. There are so many places where service is needed that I find it
