CHEF CAROL Haskins has received big congratulations from the staff of Jacques with a 20-foot-wide sign outside the seafood restaurant in Bloomfield Farms.

Recently named a certified executive chef, Ms. Haskins returned from a vacation to find a banner proclaiming, "Congratulations Chef Carol!" She is the first woman to become a certified executive chef in Michigan.

The honor was bestowed by the Chefs de Cuisine Association, Michigan branch of the American Culinary Federation, which puts her among top chefs throughout the United States. Only one title — master chef — is rated higher and held by a few chefs throughout the world.

An executive chef must pass the test (determined by point rating) not only in cooking but in related subjects such as wine tasting, art classes and food service accounting.

Chef Haskins sat down to lunch at Jacques on Monday, still excited about the honor, and talkative about her years in cooking. She loves to cook, even 20 years after she first started in the kitchen of her family's Detroit restaurant after her father died.

Her cooking ability has been noticed in the Village Woods Club in Bloomfield Hills, the Money Tree in Detroit and Tewsey's in Birmingham before she arrived at Jacques two years ago.

She said the restaurant has "the happiest kitchen in town" and points out she is always eager to share her culinary knowledge and see individuals on her staff move ahead. She likes to run the whole show, constantly getting new, creative ideas about food and watching the costs. "Salesmen hate me," she said, beaming.

The good-natured chef puts in long hours and has little time for at-home entertaining. Not only does Chef Haskins supervise Jacques lunch and dinner operations but also the restaurant's booming catering business.



DOUG JACOBS and the Real Garter Band will play its fifth year of players for the New Orleans Sunday brunch at Eden Glen in Troy on March 7.
