Class C power Detroit Country Day had a sizzling first half and roared past Cranbrook in a non-league game Tuesday.

Country Day, 15-5 overall and winners of the Metro Conference, hosts Farmington Tuesday. Cranbrook, 6-11 overall, completes its regular-season schedule with a North Oakland Activities Conference (NOAC) game at Oxford tomorrow.

Troy Athens snapped its nine-game losing streak with a 57-43 non-league victory Tuesday over Birmingham Groves.

Groves has now lost six of its last seven games.

Athens had a 26-23 halftime lead and outscored the Falcons 15-7 in the third quarter.

Mike Alfano, a 6-foot-4 junior forward, led all scorers with 17 points. Denis Corcoran scored 12 points, and Jeff Kollier added 10 points for the Red Hawks.

Athens, 3-16 overall, made 11 of 20 foul shots. The Red Hawks host Southfield-Lathrup 8 p.m. tomorrow.

Groves, 3-15 overall, made seven of 12 free throws. The Falcons host Bloomfield Hills Lahser tomorrow.

No surprise: Southfield remains No. 1

No upsets, no surprises, no changes. That's the theme for this week's Observer & Eccentric basketball rankings, as the top seven teams from last week remain in the same spot.

Southfield High, the No. 1-ranked team, had little trouble keeping its top billing, as the Blue Jays defeated Bloomfield Hills Lahser Tuesday night, 73-49. Southfield is 18-1 on the season. The Blue Jays' only loss was to unbeaten Highland Park.

Brother Rice beat Detroit East Catholic Sunday 71-39 to improve its record 13-4 and solidify the Warriors No. 2 spot.

Despite a one-point loss to Detroit De LaSalle Sunday, Orchard Lake St. Mary's still is seated in the third spot.

St. Mary's record is 13-3, with losses to highly regarded Cooley, Cody and De LaSalle.

Auburn Heights Avondale keeps knocking over its opponents, but can't climb any higher than fourth in the rankings. Avondale is 17-1, but beating far inferior teams than the opponents St. Mary's, Rice and Southfield play. Avondale, under first-year coach Larry Mahrie, broke the school record for wins Friday with its victory over Oxford.

North Farmington is the No. 5 team with its 13-5 record, and Detroit Country Day School is ranked sixth. Friday, Country Day (12-5) won its first Metro Conference league championship. Southfield-Lathrup, 13-5 overall, is

the No. 7 team in the O&E poll.

The O&E poll includes teams in the coverage areas of Birmingham-Bloomfield, Farmington, Rochester, Southfield, Troy and West Bloomfield.

The O&E rankings are compiled after polling from staff members Marty Budner, Tom Baer and Jim Hughes. Votes are tabulated on a 1-7 basis, with the top-rated team getting seven points, the No. 2 team getting six points, etc. The following is the results

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

February 16, 1982

Farmington Hills City Council held a Special meeting February 16, 1982. Mayor Burwell opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were Dolan, Williams, Burwell and Soronen. Absent: Lange, Wolf and Hughes. Others present: City Manager Savage, Assistant City Manager Costick, City Clerk Cairns, and Planning Consultant Coates. Council adjourned Zoning Map Amendment No. C62-273 to the date of March 15, 1982. Location: Northeast corner of Haggerty and Twelve Mile. Council denied Zoning request No. 29-11-81, (lot 8 Oakland Hills Orchard Sub) being Zoning Map Amendment No. C62-274. Council adjourned Vacation request No. 3-1981 for one week, to appear on the February 22, 1982 Council Agenda.

Council approved the transfer of ownership of 1977 Class C and SDM licenses from Council approved request for dance permit to be held in conjunction with 1981 Class C license located at 2250 West Eight Mile Road (Village Pump). Council authorized the City Manager to issue a purchase order to Telmar, Inc., for the City's annual supply of fertilizer.

Council approved a Traffic Control Order prohibiting left turns from Westbound Base Line Road into driveway located approximately 580 feet west of Farmington Road. Council discussed coin-operated amusement device regulations and it was the consensus of the Council to accept the Attorney's suggestion of a 60-day moratorium. Council adjourned the request for approval of hiring of relative in the Police Department to February 22, 1982 agenda. Upon motion the meeting adjourned at 9:16 p.m.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Summary)

On February 15, 1982, the regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor Alton L. Bennett in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. PRESENT: Mayor Bennett, Councilmen Hartsock, Mitchell, Tupper, Yoder. OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deane, Director Billing, Director Seifert, Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Bauby, and Administrative Assistant Horner. Minutes of previous meetings were approved. Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

A Public Hearing was held to review the proposed 1982-83 Community Development Program, having a budget of approximately \$39,000. Council approved the use of Grand River from Mooney Street to Oakland and will request the necessary State Department permit for the May 31, 1982, Memorial Day Parade.

Council received notice of a Joint/Consolidated/Contracted Services Conference on March 16 at Mercy College.

Council received and filed a request from the Cities of Escanaba and Gladstone for a contribution towards litigation costs against the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Council authorized the purchase of three police vehicles at a total cost of \$21,776.35. Council approved a new fee schedule for the building, electrical, plumbing and heating divisions, and the site plan review, effective March 1, 1982.

Council supported Oakland County's position on the pending 1982 assessed valuations of residential property.

James E. Wiley was appointed to a four-year term on the Farmington Community Library Board of Trustees.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE C-485-82
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That the Traffic Control Orders issued by the Chief of Police of the City of Farmington dated February 4, 1977 are hereby amended to add Section 6.3 to the City Code 6.6, as provided for in Section 2.53 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages.

CHAPTER 6 - "REGULATIONS PROHIBITING STOPPING, STANDING AND PARKING"

ADD THE FOLLOWING:

Section 6.3 Downtown Farmington Shopping Center

The curb area in the block having addresses running from 33171 through 33199 Grand River, less fifty-seven (57) feet from the southern curb line of Grand River to a point forty-one (41) feet north of the southern curb line of said block shall be designated a "FREIGHT CURB LOADING ZONE" as provided in Section 2.37, and shall be enforced on a twenty-four (24) hour per day basis as provided in Section 6.18. Parking in the area of fifty-seven (57) feet south from the southern curb line of Grand River and forty-one (41) feet north of the southern curb line of said block shall be prohibited at any time and designated as a "No Stopping, Standing or Parking Zone."

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on February 1, 1982, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on February 15, 1982, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.

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It's Rice vs. St. Mary's

Birmingham Brother Rice plays Redford St. Mary's at 8:15 p.m. this evening at University of Detroit's Calhoun Hall in a semifinal Catholic League playoff basketball game.

Rice (13-4) qualified for the semifinals with an easy 71-39 victory over East Catholic in the tournament's first round Sunday afternoon. St. Mary's (17-0) advanced into the second round with a tougher 61-57 victory over Southgate Aquinas.

"I see St. Mary's as a more experienced, seasoned team than East Catho-

lic," said Rice coach Nick Conti. "They're strong at all five starting spots."

In the other semifinal game, Detroit DeLaSalle (15-2) plays the University of Detroit (15-4) at 6:45 p.m.

DeLaSalle opened the tournament with a physical 55-54 victory over Orchard Lake St. Mary's. The Cubs outlasted DePorres in its first game, 63-62.

The winners qualify for the tournament finals that will be played 4 p.m. Sunday.

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
