

WHEN HISTORIC old buildings came too close to the wrecking ball in Dallas, they were rescued, restored and placed in a city-owned park. You can wander around or picnic free, or you can pay \$4 for a ticket to visit any of the restored buildings. One of the treasures is an 1886 rail-way depot with a little larceny in its historic background. The Texas Pacific Railway would have missed Dallas by 50 miles if some scounder hadn't tagged condition the state legislation: the railway must run within a mile of Browder Springs.

Nobody knew or cared where Brodwer Springs was located until the Legislature learned that it was in downtown Dallas. The railway came to town and by 1980 Dallas was the biggest city in Texas. If you brought the kids, don't forget that you can see real cowboys in rodeo, dance hall, bar and stockyard setting 28 miles west in Fort Worth, and that the area between Dallas and Fort Worth blossoms with amusenests.
