

W. Bloomfield eliminates Andover

West Bloomfield qualified for the district championship for the second straight year Tuesday night with a methodical 55-40 victory over Bloomfield Hills Andover.

It was West Bloomfield's second victory over Andover in six days. Last week, the Lakers defeated the Barons 49-42 in the final regular-season game for both teams.

Coach Frank Piecas' Lakers will play the winner of the Brother Rice-Bloomfield Hills Laker game which was played last night. The championship game is scheduled for 7 p.m. tomorrow.

The Lakers, who lost to Brother Rice

earlier in the season by a score of 72-40, will enter the district title game with a 13-8 overall record.

Against Andover, West Bloomfield rolled to a 24-16 halftime lead. The Lakers outscored the Barons 19-10 in the third quarter to virtually ice the game.

Todd Rich led West Bloomfield with 17 points, and Todd Krumm added nine.

Andover, which shot 39 percent from the floor (19-50), was led by Brian Aili and Scot Miller who each had 10 points. Bob Burnside had seven rebounds for Andover.

Andover finished its season with a 3-18 record.

BROTHER RICE 61 GROVES 48

Rice started slowly, but erupted in the third quarter to defeat Birmingham Groves in this first round Class A district game at Groves Monday evening.

"I thought Groves played well in the first half," said Rice coach Nick Conti, whose team lost its last regular-season game Friday to Detroit Southwestern High School.

"We just kind of busted it open in the second half, and that pretty much told the story. It's hard to play in an emotional game like we had last night Friday, and come back with the intensity that we should."

"We played about as hard as we had to," he said.

Rice led 22-19 at halftime, but outscored the Falcons 22-10 in the third quarter.

Rice, which shot 49 percent from the field (26-53), was led by Paul Jokisch with 25 points. Dennis Kosak had 14 points and Greg Diggins added 10.

Mike Green had nine points as the leading scorer for Groves. Mark McGrath and B.J. Cameron each had eight points.

Groves finished the season with a 6-14 record.

Royal Oak Kimball defeated Birmingham Seaholm in a first-round district Class A basketball game Monday

at Kimball High School. The Maples held a 25-24 halftime advantage.

However, Seaholm suffered a second-half letdown. The Maples trailed by one point after three quarters, but were outscored 22-12 in the fourth quarter.

"The difference was the fourth quarter," said Seaholm coach Lew Parry. "We stopped hitting and fell behind. We went to the press and they scored some easy baskets on us. They were a stronger rebounding team than us. And, they shot better from the free-throw line than we did."

Seaholm made 20 baskets to Kimball's 18. However, the Knights made 22 of 29 free throws while the Maples made seven of 16 from the line.

Craig Scott led Seaholm with 15 points, and teammate Mike Chew added 14. Brian Nefcy was the next highest scorer with eight.

Gary Peters led Kimball with 25 points.

Seaholm finished the season with a 5-16 record.

OLSM prevails, 63-55

Orchard Lake St. Mary's lost three basketball games during the regular season — all three to upper-class teams from Detroit.

The Eagles, considered a strong contender for the state Class C title, lost games this year to two Class A Detroit schools — Cooley and Coss Tech — and DeLaSalle. St. Mary's finished the season with 17 wins.

Monday night, in a first-round Class C district game on its home court, Orchard Lake St. Mary's defeated rugged Redford St. Mary's, 63-55. Coach Bob Shoemaker figured those regular-season losses prepared his Eagles for the much-ballyhooed bout against the more physical Rustics.

"(Those losses) told our kids we could play with anybody," said Shoemaker, whose team played its second district game last night against Pontiac Northern (a team St. Mary's defeated twice this season by a combined total of 51 points).

"I feel our best basketball is ahead of us. (Our players) are still learning how to do things," he said. "We have to get

ready for everybody."

The Eagles took a giant step toward their march to the 1982 Class C state championship with their win Monday. It came before 1,200 vocal fans on their home court, which became as slippery as an ice rink late in the game because of condensation that formed on the court from the high humidity.

ST. MARY'S took command of the game with a 21-12 scoring advantage in the third quarter. The Eagles utilized the fast break to take a 47-33 margin heading into the fourth quarter.

"We saw they (the Rustics) had a habit of crashing the boards," said Shoemaker. "So, we said when (the fast break) is there, go for it."

"We let them come back, and we know a team like that has a lot of heart. I thought we had a battle on the boards. It may have been one of our best rebounding efforts of the season."

The Rustics, who lost to Birmingham Brother Rice by one point in the recent Catholic League playoffs, outbounded the Eagles, 38-29. Senior forward Aubin Williams led the Rustics with a game-high 14 rebounds.

However, the Rustics' rebounding

advantage was offset by Chris Horvitz of the Eagles. The 6-foot-5 senior forward played a strong game at both ends of the court.

Green finished with 11 points, and forward Chris Sass and Davis each had nine. Kevin Scott scored 17 for the Rustics.

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FHS' Green picks UNLV

Stacy Green, the 6-foot-3 center on Farmington High School's girls' basketball team, has signed a national letter of intent to attend the University of Nevada-Las Vegas on a basketball scholarship.

Green, an '81 all-stater at Farmington, helped the Falcons compile a 20-3 record and win the Inter Lakes League championship.

Green, who plans to major in sociology, was contacted by more than 100 colleges. After visiting some of the schools, she decided on UNLV because of "the outstanding facilities, the high ranking of their sociology department, the UNLV schedule and the climate," she said.

UNLV plays most of its road games in California and has a trip to Hawaii.

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:00 p.m. on March 1, 1982, by Mayor Alton L. Bennett in Council Chambers, 23990 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Mayor Bennett, Councilmen Hartsock and Mitchell

Minutes of previous meetings were approved.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Farmington Youth Assistance representatives presented their biennial report of activities.
