RICE MEMORIAL was organized in November of 1964. Up to now, the congregation has been meeting in three buildings formerly part of the Henry Ford Trade School and moved onto the property. Two of these buildings have been used for church school and meetings, and the one that has been the sanctuary will be converted to make more classrooms.

The new sanctuary, which cost approximately \$140,000, had its cornerstone laid July 13, 1969. The architect was Fisher, Ciancio & Associates, and the general contractor was the Chase Co.

"A House of Prayer for All Peoples," the inscription on the outside wall of the new church, is a phrase that Rev. Barnes, who has headed the congregation several months, hopes will grow in meaning in the community.

Each half hour service will include scripture reading, prayer, and music. Worshipers will be seated on the hour and half-hour and will be asked to leave at the same intervals.

This annual union fellowship of worship has been an inspiration to all who have attended and has formed a bond between the cooperating churches. It is being held at the Rice Memorial Methodist Church this year to acquaint the community with its just-finished sanctuary.
