

Strauss Piece Is Solo

The soloist, a Franklin High School senior, and a group of junior high school musicians will debut in the third concert of the Livonia Youth Symphony on Sunday, March 22.

Concert time is 4 p.m. in the Wayne Memorial High School, 3001 Fourth, Wayne.

The program is in keeping with the symphony's year long theme of "Youth makes music in Livonia and music makes youth."

CONDUCTOR of the Livonia Youth Symphony is Lester Farkas. Members of the group are students from the ninth grade through college level.

In addition to the Strauss number, the musical program includes: Bernstein's "West Side Story"; "Scheherazade" by Rimsky-Korsakov and Haydn's "Symphonie No. 48".

Tickets to the concert will be available at the door. They are priced at \$3.50 for the family, \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children. Senior citizens will be admitted free of charge.

Sports, Fairs, Festivals In State

When admonished to "fly your kite, take a walk, paddle your own canoe" or "dance a fling," Michigan's spring and summer vacation visitors could do exactly as they are told, according to the March-August Michigan Calendar of Events.

Among the more than 200 activities listed in the publication are kite flying, hiking, canoe racing, and dancing the highland fling as well as other exciting community events throughout both peninsulas.

FAIRS AND festivals account for many listings. Holland's annual tribute to its famed tulips, May 12-16, and the Benton Harbor-St. Joseph Blossomtime Festival, May 3-9, are harbingers of warm-weather days ahead, as are the Maple Syrup Festivals at Empire, March 29, and at Vermontville, April 25. More than 57 county, state, and community fairs appear on the calendar.

A choice of a wide variety of events is available to sports fans throughout both peninsulas. Among the events listed are the Cross Country Ski races, Copper Harbor, March 7-8; the State Basketball Tournaments, March 18-20; Lansing; the American Indoor Archery Tournament, March 20-22; Cobalt, Detroit, Top-O-Michigan Marathon, July 11-12; Tinianee; and the West Michigan Yachting Regatta, August 5-9, Muskegon.

SEVERAL FISHING festivals are listed, including the National Trout Festival, Kalamazoo, April 24-25; Father's Day Fishing Derby, June 14, Bergland; Troutarama, Baldwin, July 23-25; and the Michigan Salmon Derby, Aug. 15-22, Manistee.

Art fairs and exhibits throughout Michigan include the Tech Arts Festival, Hough-

ton, May 11-17; Arts and Crafts Festival, June 5-6; Lansing Art Show, August, June 20; Art and Flower Show, Grand Haven, July 17-18; and the Waterfront Art Fair, Charlevoix, Aug. 8.

Numbered among the other activities on the calendar are the Easter Baby Animal Display, Nature Center, Kalamazoo, March 24-April 4; Country Fair of Yesteryear, Greenfield Village, May 21-23; Bavarian Festival, Frankenmuth, June 14-20; and the Danish Festival, Greenville, Aug. 22.

'Marooned' Deals With Big Question

David Jensen is the chief astronaut Ted Dougherty, the technician who has a strong emotional response to the problem and leads the fight for the rescue mission.

"Marooned" deals with this question with a blend of science fiction and documentary techniques, and the result is a spellbinding film.

The film tells the story of a space shot and a five-month test period of the astronauts living in space and then the failure of the space capsule's rockets to fire for re-entry.

BASES OF THE is the interaction of the men of the space program, their emotional responses and the technology of the program along with a dash of practical politics which dictates the launching of a rescue mission which few believe can be successful.

Gregory Peck is the very symbol of the controlled and professional technician as the director of the manned space program, Dr. Charles Keith.

MAROOINED - now showing at The Quo Vadis Rating: G

INSIDE THE spaceship, we find one super-technician who never loses his cool (James Franciscus); a calm technician who just manages to maintain control (Richard Crenna); and the man of action who finds the waiting intolerable (Gene Hackman).

The scene switches from space ship to the Houston Space Center to Cape Kennedy and then back to the spaceship.

Tensions mount until the question of whether or not the rescue flight is successful is answered in the final scene.

Acting Classes Open At Village

Joseph French, manager of the Theater Arts department at Dearborn's Henry Ford Museum, has announced a class in acting for the stage at the museum beginning April 11.

The course is designed to acquaint young people, 14 or older, with the basic techniques and skills involved in the recreation of 19th century drama of the type presented in the museum's American Drama Festival. It will be a study-work class which could lead students into the festival's apprenticeship program.

APPROXIMATELY 80% of the course will be concerned with the study of 19th century acting styles—speech, elocution, movement, gesture, interpretation and emotion. The remainder of the time will be devoted to production techniques—scenery, construction, scenic painting, furnishings, decor and costuming.
