Etiquette Tips For Wedding

There are no hard and fast rules for many wedding customs. However, depending on where you live, usual ways of doing things do develop. Joyce Mazzoni, Graduate Bridal-Consultant headquartered at Orin Jewelers in Garden City, advises many couples on the correct thing to do for Observerland weddings.

Formal weddings, even in spring and summer, require long gloves with sleeveless gowns. For a semi-formal affair at which a cocktail dress is worn, short gloves are de rigeour. The bride's family sits at the left side of the aisle, the groom's on the right-hand side. If there is a disproportionate number expected from either side, notify the head usher to seat some guests on the other side for the sake of uniformity.

After the mother of the bride comes down the aisle, no one else is to be seated. Latecomers must wait until the entire bridal party is at the altar.

The groom should present a small gift to the mother of the bride prior to her coming down the aisle. This gesture, usually a small charm or pin is a thank you for making the day possible. It is a reflection of the status of the mother of the bride as official hostess.


Wedding invitations are always formal, even if the ceremony is small and informal. Always use white paper with black printing.

WEDDING INVITATIONS are for the ceremony itself. This is a sacred ceremony, and is separate from the reception, which is a social occasion. For this reason, invitations to the reception must be on a card separate from the wedding invitation. A reply card for the reception is not always necessary.

Many Observerland couples use a phone number on the last line of the reception card asking guests to R.S.V.P. by telephone. The number, because it must be that of someone who is sure to be at home, is usually not that of the bride.

On the inside envelope of the invitation, a family with children is addressed as Mr. and Mrs. Smith, followed by a listing of the children's names. On the outside envelope, the correct form is Mr. and Mrs. John Smith. No mention of their children is made.

Thank you notes are always signed by the bride. Gifts from a married couple are acknowledged by addressing the envelope to Mr. and Mrs. Jones. The note itself begins, "Dear Mrs. Jones, John and I wish to thank you and Mr. Jones for the lovely...(itemizing the gift)."
