New classes will be blooming along with spring flowers at the Farmington Community Center. Registration days are Monday and Tuesday, March 23, 24 from 10 a.m.-5 p.m.

Included among newcomers to the list of available classes is one in Ikebana (Japanese flower arranging) to be taught by Mrs. Van Astrom for six Monday mornings beginning April 13.

The class consists of basic instruction in the Moribana style of arrangement with two variations. Emphasis will be on arrangements particularly

suited to western decor. Fee is \$30, and the class limit is 14.

Mrs. Askounis is president of the Detroit chapter of Ikebana International. She has studied the method for 15 years and is well-known as a teacher throughout the Detroit-Birmingham area.

She will instruct a hanging basket workshop during June, also.

MRS. BETTY FRANKEL will conduct three Tuesday afternoon classes in gardening and landscape design beginning April 14, for a fee of \$7.50.

A free lance landscape designer, Mrs. Frankel is also known for her gardening columns in area newspapers. She will cover principles of landscape design and garden planning, horticulture and garden practices with time for discussion of specific gardening problems.

Still in the springtime theme are Mrs. Ruth Trombley's sessions on flower arranging. They will run for four Wednesday mornings beginning April 22 with a fee of \$10 and a class limit of 15. Mrs. Trombley is a floral designer, has taught for 10 years, and has won many blue ribbons for her creative arrangements.

PHOTOGRAPHY WILL be taught for 10 Tuesday evenings under the direction of Herbert D. Shapiro. Classes will cover basic principles including operation of an adjustable camera, darkroom procedure.

Palace Denied Use Of Alley

FARMINGTON The Farmington City Council has denied a request to close an alley to allow construction of a Palace restaurant on Grand River just east of the Purple Plume.

Steve Polgar, Livonia attorney representing the restaurant developer, says the building can be located on the three lots even if the alley remained open.

But closing would give more flexibility in developing the site, Mayor Wilbur Brubaker explained he voted no simply because he was opposed to the 24-hour operation and hoped the developer would change his mind on the hours.

Polgar says the restaurant will be a 24-hour operation but there will be no eating outside and no carryout service. He described it as a family restaurant.

Councilman John Allen suggested keeping the alley open to force the owner to redesign the restaurant building to better fit the property instead of using the standard building plans of the Palace restaurant chain.

Allen said the city wants to upgrade the area near the Purple Plume and a 24-hour operation would only bring noise and confusion.

After the council denied the request to close the alley, Mayor Wilbur Brubaker explained he voted no simply because he was opposed to the 24-hour operation and hoped the developer would change his mind on the hours.

IN OTHER ACTION, the council passed a resolution and

forwarded it to Sen. George Kuhn (R-14) and Rep. Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) urging legislation to establish a commission to set water rates for the Detroit Metropolitan Water Service.

An impartial review board made up of state department heads of agencies pertaining to water and sewer services provided by Detroit would be beneficial to all suburban communities says City Manager John Dinan.

"We believe an unbiased board, with no axe to grind, would be in a position to levy equitable rates to all the suburban communities that are served by the City of Detroit," he added.

The council gave permission to the following to use the

city's lighted ball diamond at Power and Shawwassee Pds. this summer. Farmington Womens Softball Team; Farmington Jaycee's Softball Team; and the Farmington Softball League.

The council accepted bids for trees and placed an order which will result in over 200 trees being planted next month.

PERMISSION WAS given the Department of Public Safety to take bids on four patrol cars, one detective car and a station wagon.

The city has agreed to sell a 1960 White Load Packer for \$1500 to the McCreeley Trucking Company, Inc. A parade permit was given the Veterans Memorial Day Services parade committee.
