

Commission welcomes public to historical dedication gala

The dedication of the Farmington Historical Museum on the site of the Governor Fred M. Warner Mansion Saturday, May 22 is open to all residents of the city.

Margaret Walker, chairman of the Farmington Historical Commission, said there has been a misunderstanding about two events planned that afternoon.

The noon dedication of the museum which will take place on the front steps of the mansion is open to anyone in the community. However, a light luncheon inside the mansion/museum is open only to invited dignitaries.

"The dedication will be open to the public and a warm and cordial invitation is extended to the entire community to be on hand for the ceremony," Mrs. Walker emphasized.

The mansion will be the site of a \$100-per-person museum benefit 7:30 p.m. May 22 which will be followed by a dance at the downtown Masonic Temple, formerly the town hall.

An open house at the museum for members of the Farmington area and the general public is planned for Sunday, May 23 following dedication of the Warner Gardens at 2 p.m.

The gardens are to be called the Edessa Warner Slocum Colonial Herb Garden and the Marie Walling Parker Victorian Rose Garden.

Ms. Slocum was Gov. Warner's oldest child and the last occupant of the house, said Mrs. Walker. Ms. Parker was a friend of the Warner family, one of the founders of the Farmington Players theater group and president of the 1925 class at Farmington High School.

"WHILE THE restoration and adaptation of the city's most prestigious historical landmark is far from finished, the commission is eager to show the progress which has been made to date through the generous donations and volunteer efforts of those who have been supporting the project," Mrs. Walker said.

The Farmington-8 Lions Club is sponsoring two of the events during the Warner celebration weekend. Club members are planning the candlelight banquet and ball the evening of May 22 and an old-fashioned ice cream social on the museum lawn, beginning 2 p.m. Sunday.

Mrs. Walker stressed that the Sunday open house is free but visitors must pay for ice cream at the ice cream social.

HAVING TROUBLE SAVING? HERE ARE SOME IDEAS
1. Payroll deduction savings plan. If your company operates one, sign up. Yes, it's another deduction, but you'll get this one back.
2. The "I-itch-from-yourself" plan. At the end of the day, hold out all coins — or dollars bills, if possible. At the end of the week, deposit the accumulation in your savings account.
