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HFH emergency room lights up for youngsters

Fifteen youngsters from the Adat Shalom nur-sery school in Farmington Hills toured Henry Ford Hospital's West Bloomfield Center emergency room Thursday as part of a study unit on the com-munity and the hospital.

Head Nurse Sandy Wormser led the children first to the incubator for newborns where they took turns reaching through the unit's window to feel the warmth inside.

They watched as Wormser, a West Bloomfield resident, hooked up the leads of the emergency beart monitor to one of their classmates, Jeremy Spoon, and the pattern of Jeremy's heartbeats flashed across the screen.

"Td like each of you to know that this is a friend,

not an enemy," said Wormser, as she helped the children try on a small mask used for people who come in with breathing problems. The children listened for the "beep" of the electric thermometer as another volunteer had her temperature taken, tried on "Freddie the frog" (a finger splint) and listened to their own heartbeats on the stethoscope.

The center's 24-hour emergency room sees an average of 80 patients each day, some 35 percent of them children.
"I think this will help the children be less frightened if they should ever have a real visit to an emergency room," said Shirley Zimmerman, nurse coordinator.
