Boaz and Eva Kahana, a sociology professor at Wayne State University and director of the Elderly Care Re-search Center in Detroit, plan to lead a group of 25 on the summer tour.

They will focus on special environ-ments, services and programs for the aged offered in Sweden, Norway, Fin-

"We want to show people the array of richness of services, the well-planned and thought-out services the aged get in Scandinavian countries." said Kahana, who is also director of the Mental Health and Aging Training Program at Wayne State and Oakland universities.

The 17-day tour includes visits to Scandinavian nursing homes, community centers and special housing facilities for the elderly. The Southfield couple lecture throughout the trip, but are careful to include free time for sight-

"THEY HAVE more flexible programs," added Mrs. Kahana. "If a person cannot live independently here, we put them in the nursing home. We don't have day care programs for the elderly or various housing programs, programs that help cope with their disabilities instead of institutionalizing them.

"I hope that people going on the trip will see innovations, weigh them and implement them," said Kahana. 
He thinks huge malls in our country make the elderly feel lost, but is encouraged by the store front shops that invited the aged in for coffee, donuts and conversation.
