Death of a sport

This occurred in wake of a law suit recently filed an Ann Arbor group called the League of Parents, Students and Educators Involved in School Athleite Practices. They are suing the Michigan High School Athleite Association (MHSAA) for discrimination against females in the structure of rules, decision-making and monitoring procedures. The MEA Women's Caucas, the Coalition for Non-Sexist Education, and National Organization for Women have also joined in the suit.

THE GROUP cited the MHSAA Handbook which shows that 557 Michi-gan high schools offered golf for boys and only 175 for girls last year. The group also contends that the MHSAA rulings crowd most major

girls' sports into the fall, out of the standard season for some, in order to free facilities for boys during the "proper" season. Field hockey is one sport that suffers, according to the plaintiffs. The MHSAA has eliminated that tournament, causing young women to receive little publicity and commu-nity sunport.
