New 'Cat People' dwells in realm of erotic fantasy

Is it possible to not like a film but still find it fascinating? Certainly. "Cat People" (R) falls into that category for me.

I don't care for the grisly scenes. There is one, in particular, in which a man has his arm ripped off. Blood spurts from the torn artery and bare bone protrudes from the socket.

There are other repulsive scenes which can best be described as "yeach". This same movie, however, has the compelling quality of a myth that captures the viewer's imagination and doesn't let go.

It begins in a myth-like way with hot colors, blowing sands and sensual music. In this timeless, unspecified place, a strange ritual of sacrifice is being conducted.

THE SCENE THEN shifts to New Orleans and the present. Emphasis on the cerie and mysterious qualities of the city and its surroundings make it an ideal site for perpetuating the myth. Paul Schrader, the director of "Cat People," has created an erotic supernatural fantasty that Lakes place in the real world. The actual story sounds more silly than scary, but by charging it with sexual energy, maintaining a tense atmosphere and incorporating religious references, Schrader creates a powerful cinematic experience.

The premise (don't expect a rational explanation) is that in some distant time and place women were sacrificed to leopards, and there developed a strain of leopards with human souls and humans of leopard ancestry. The human can only mate with other "eat people" otherwise, they turn back into leopard ancestry.

Irena (Nastassia Kinski), unknown to her, is one of these cat people. She travels to New Orleans to live with her brother Paul (Malcoim McDowell) who has sent for her. They had been separated as children after their parents' deaths.

Paul tells Irena of their origins and their sexual need for each other. She runs from him in horror, and he goes on a rampage of lust and killing. McDowell handles his role adeptly. His pleasing, open face changes to a sadistic grin as he make incestuous advances to Kinski.

IN KINSKI, the director has found the perfect actress to convey both innocence and sensuality. Her amazingly mobile face fits the duality of her role as does her body — slim as the young virgin, lithe as the seductress.

nnette O'Toole brings a healthy dose of normality to the situa-as a zoo employee with a crush on the head curator, Oliver

(John Heard).

However, she is a bit too normal for him. He finds himself attracted to Irena, perhaps sensing the duality of her being.

The New Orleans zoo, where Irena also works, is itself a bleak place where the sleek beauty of a captured panther contrasts with the ugliness of its prison. It reinforces the notion that Schräder uses this fantasy of the cat people as a metaphor for dealing with a variety of sexual attitudes and taboos:

Incest, bondage, virginal sacrifice and promiscuity are some of the themes which occur. The leopards, caged or free, suggest a corollary to sexual drive, shackled or unleashed.

The "Cat People" originally was produced in 1942 by horror master Val Lewton and directed by Jacques Tourneur. Alan Ormsby rewrote the script and Schrader infused it with erotic tension borne on a Calvinist conscience. The result is a unique supernatural fantasy, begulling to view, if far from purr-fect.
