

Social Security cuts boost OCC enrollments

More than 2,000 high school students have enrolled in Oakland Community College's spring term so they can receive Social Security benefits for financial assistance.

Beginning May 1, Social Security benefits for eligible college students will be eliminated. The aid cut was approved by President Reagan as part of his budget cuts.

Youths have to be full-time college students by May 1 in order to qualify for the 1982 money.

"We established many special sections so these kids could get into college on time," said OCC President Robert Roelofs.

"BECAUSE THIS timing was between semesters, we had to work quickly. But we did it, with the great help of all," he added.

To be considered full-time during spring term, students must take six credit hours.

"We established about 20 classes for them to take, the most popular being political science, psychology, sociology and math," Roelofs said.

The 2,000 students are spread out between all campuses.

Here's how area senators voted after returning from the Senate's Easter recess. There were no house votes.

CUBAN POLICY — By a vote 41 for and 39 against, the Senate killed a non-binding resolution similar to one approved by Congress at the time of the 1962 Cuban missile crisis. Among other provisions, the measure reaffirmed the Monroe Doctrine, urged a tougher policy towards the Castro regime in Cuba, and recommended military action if necessary to thwart international communist subversion in the Western Hemisphere. The vote occurred during debate on legislation (Sen. Res. 20) to permit televising Senate floor proceedings.

Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., who supported killing the measure, said the resolution could upset the administration's delicate efforts to involve Mexico, Cuba and other hemispheric nations

in the search for peace in Central America. Dodd added that the measure "resurrects the ghost of the Tonkin Gulf resolution by giving the president virtually a blank check to undertake whatever military action he deems appropriate without obtaining a declaration of war or without any further congressional involvement."

Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, the sponsor of the resolution, said the vote at hand was "a vote for the Monroe Doctrine, and a vote for prevention of a Soviet military base in Cuba. It will be a vote for opposing Soviet-Cuban aggression and subversion in the Western Hemisphere."

Senators voting "yes" wanted to table and thus kill the Symms resolution. Sen. Carl Levin, D, voted "yes." Sen. Donald Riegle, D, did not vote.

Dust control deadline nears

The Oakland County Road Commission will accept orders for road dust control calcium chloride service through May 1 only.

Road Commission Vice Chairman John R. Gnan Jr. announced the deadline and said:

"To order or to obtain information, contact the Road Commission's Department of Citizen Services, at 2430 Pontiac Lake Road, Pontiac, or by television, 858-4803 or 4805.

"Individual orders must be for a minimum of 1,000 lineal feet of roadway. Only public roadway is eligible. The rate of application is 1,000 gallons

per mile to a width of 16 to 20 feet."

The cost is 30 cents per lineal foot (\$300 per 1,000 feet), which covers four applications during the year. Some townships contribute to the cost, as determined by township officials.

Some townships contract with the Road Commission for township-wide application and pay 25 cents per lineal foot (\$250 per 1,000 feet).

The Road Commission's Department of Citizen Services will provide any information it has about participation by townships, but doesn't always know particulars of townships plans, policies or procedures.

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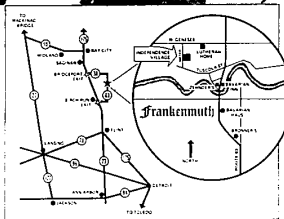
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
