Ask anyone involved in the real estate industry why private property rights are so important, and you'll probably get a variation of the same theme.

During Private Property Week (April 18-24), area Realtor groups have joined together to educate the public on the threats to property rights.

"We tend to take many things for granted, but we should recognize that federal, sales and local governments have powers that affect our private proerty rights, and sometimes they affect them adversely, "explains Frick.

"A zoning ordinance, for instance, can restrict the use of an individual's property. A succession of property tax increases, though not directly limiting the use of property, can seriously

burden owners living on fixed or limited incomes," he said, in pointing out some of the threats to private property ownership.

THE PRESIDENT of the Rochester Board of Realitors takes another approach to defending property rights.
"Private ownership of real property is a major contributor to a strong democracy and a free people," said hulto Laquerta.
"The vast majority of the public agrees that widespread home ownership pearures greater democracy, and that private ownership of property disperses decision making to each bousehold over the use and protection of each home, he said.
"Private Property Week is celebrated not only to remind Americans of the significance of ownership rights, but to dramatize the role of these rights so that they will be preserved for posterity." Laquerta said.

And to emphasize the right of house ownership, the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors has been a pioneer in offering free house buying seminars.

These presentations provide a range of basic information on house buying from saving for a downpayment to financing options, says board president Lloyd Mason. 
