Teacher-turned-banker named Young Careerist

Nancy Morrin, a teacher-turned-banker who lives in Westland, is the Young Career Woman of 1982 for District IX of the Michigan Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

Sponsored by the Canton BPW club for the annual competition in a district that spreads west from Detroit, Morrin was picked by three judges from a field of nine young women in careers that ranged from second-grade teacher to automobile production supervisor.

Morrin will represent the district at the BPW state convention June 4-6 in Battle Creek, vying with a dozen other district winners for the honor of being the organization's Young Career Woman of Michigan and helping to represent the state at the national convention in San Antonio late in July.

Chosen as alternate was Sheryl Kereulik, who is an educational consultant but reports that selling real estate "is the love of my life." Kereulik was sponsored by the Northville BPW. Other contestants were sponsored by BPW clubs of Farmington, Redford, Garden City, Wayne, Plymouth, Novi

and Detroit. Marilyn Allmick of the Plymouth BPW was in charge of the competition.

Finals in the event and announcement of the selections came at the District IX spring meeting Sunday in the Livonia Holiday Inn Hollidome.

WINNING OF THE District IX title came three days before Morrin's 25th birthday. "It's a great present," she smiled.

It also fit well with the talk she had made before more than 50 BPW members from 13 clubs gathered for the spring meeting.

"In order to achieve my goals I must actively pursue them," stated the dark-haired Canton club representative in speech that formed part of the competition. "My goal is achievement."

Part of her achievement so far came somewhat accidentally, she noted. A graduate of Eastern Michigan University in business education, she taught a class for unwed mothers for six months in the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

Then it was summer and she went to work for Kelly Services, which sent her first to Manufacturer's Bank as a secretary. "They asked me if I would like to get into their management training program," she said.

Alternate Kereulik, a resident of Northville, is also trained in education and is employed in the intermediate school district but considers her best career opportunities are probably in non-education fields.

She told the BPW gathering "I had to ask where my skills could be applied."

"It's pretty scary to be 28 with eight years of post-secondary schooling and know that no school district within 200 miles would hire you," she noted.

JUDGES FOR the Young Careerist competition were Celestia Adams, resident affairs officer and director of central records for the Plymouth Center for Human Development, Stacey Henne, specialist with the Livonia district community education division, and Mary Jane Kay, director of medical records for Lynn Hospital and the district's 1981 Young Career Woman.

"I have done a lot of judging," said Henne, "and this was the most difficult choice I remember. This was a fantastic group of young women. They gave me inspiration for my own work."

Each participant had earlier been through a similar competition at club level. Each made a written statement of qualifications, then gave a three-minute speech before BPW members and judges and had a 10-minute inter-

view with the judging panel.

"We were looking," said Henne, "for competence in understanding the BPW state and national platform and its legislative issues, particularly the issues that pertain to the candidate's chosen work."

She added that speeches were judged on originality and how the candidate presented herself, and in the interviews the judges looked for "awareness of where they are and where they are going."

"There was not one of the participants not well grounded in the BPW positions," said Henne, "and all of them had the knowledge they need to move in their careers."

To be eligible for Young Career Woman, BPW members have to be be-

tween the ages of 21 and 30, employed in business or a profession for at least a year and outstanding in scholastic work, community service or church work.

MORRIN SAID she joined the Canton BPW on the advice of a friend, although she is a resident of Westland.

"When I first joined I made it my goal to win the Young Career Woman competition," she said she mentioned the contest to her fiancé, Bob Zimmerman of Westland. "He said 'You're going to win' and here I am!" she beamed after the judging was over.

Accepting the pin that denoted the district title, she thanked "my Canton club and my coach."

Alzheimer Week declared

The chapter of the national organization was brought to Michigan by Nancy Lombardo and Sarah Glover, both Bloomfield Hills residents.

Alzheimer's disease afflicts about 100,000 Michigan citizens, about half of whom live in the Detroit area.

The chapter has reached about 1,000 families since it was chartered officially in January 1981.

The Rev. Kahn-Schneider will be joined in the pulpit by the Rev. Doana Osterhout, from Christ United Methodist Church of Inkster.



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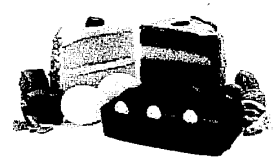
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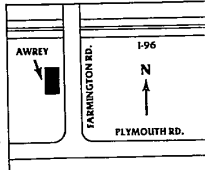
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
