year there will be 25 quilts, dating from 1820 to 1940, from private collections.

The highlight of exhibit will be a a 25-square, applique quilt from New England that is a particular tressure because each of the squares apparently tells a story. Not only are the applique pieces in each square symbols of family interests and background, but each square contains many names written in indelible ink.

"Most friendship quilts are made for an occasion like a wedding," Silber said. "And most friendship quilts are patchwort; this is applique."

The background, other than being from New England, is vague. The piece can be dated from 1876 on a little piece fabric in a corner. That means this may have been a centennial project. It

is particularly unusual because each person making the quilt-squares was apparently encouraged to be creative as the foreshoes are in several squares and appliques of figures of figures of children cut from pictures on fabric control for a chair, a book (ship's log?), a star and a circle that could represent the sun. 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
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
