not the time and place for disarmament. We're not secure enough."

Ballegger said he favored disarmament but didn't know how it would be accomplished.

JAPANESE TRADE regulations brought out other differences. Only Huber strongly favored import restrictions.

"We ought to insist on a two-way street," Huber said. "We must ask that foreign nations have the same import regulations imposed on them that we have on us. We need higher protection for American products."

Ruppe, whose comments were echoed by Baker and Ballegger, said, "I don't think trade restrictions is the way to go. If we passed quota legislation, then we'd be forcing Japan to put factories in this coun-

ty that probably won't be in Michigan but will be on the coasts," Ruppe said.

Ballegger recommended the auto industry diversify and become competitive in areas of high technology.

ON SOCIAL Security, all four Republicans took shots at incumbent Democrat Riegle.

"Don Riegle is one of the biggest enemies of Social Security," said Ballegger. "He's totally irresponsible. The system is in severe financial difficulty. It's had seven benefit hikes since the '50s and only one revenue hike, in 1977. He uses it to appeal to certain interest groups."

Huber agreed, saying Democratic politicians use the Social Security issue "just to get votes."

Baker called it a "politically explosive issue that should be dealt with in a bipartisan approach."

**Officials to learn grant rules**

The Michigan Department of Commerce will hold a series of public meetings to inform local officials about the guidelines for getting money through the Small Cities Community Block Grant Program.

The Detroit area meeting will be 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. May 19 at Ypsilanti Township Hall, 7200 S. Huron River Drive. Commerce Department representatives will explain how municipalities in Wayne and Oakland counties can receive money for economic development and housing and public works projects. All municipalities with populations over 50,000 qualify separately. Those with under 50,000 people fall under the county's request.

There is more than \$30.5 million available to Michigan communities this year.
