## Young women called to vie for title of 'Miss Farmington'

Applications are now available for local women interested in entering the 1982 Miss Farmington Scholarship Pageant that will be directed by Patricia Fallan.

The ninth annual scholarship pageant is open to young women who have been residents of Farmington or Farmington Hills since Jan. 1, 1981, and have never been married. Entrants must be at least 17 years of age and not more than 24 years old as of Sept. 15, 1982.

One of the most popular events of the annual Farmington Founders Festival, the winner of this year's Miss Farmington Scholarship Pageant will advance to the 1983 Miss Michigan Scholarship Pageant, and possibly even go on to compete in the Miss America Pageant. Contestants will be judged on personality, poise, talent, and swimsuit and evening gown presentations by a panel of qualified judges. The women entering the contest will participate in special workshops and seminars prior to pageant competition, receiving instructions in personal grooming, talent presentations, and modeling and interviewing techniques.
