The \$50 million by which Gov. William Milliken last week cut the state budget was the price he paid to get the needed state Senate vote May 11 to pass a

Here is how Gov. Milliken's executive order for \$50 million in state budget cuts will hit insti-tutions in Oakland County, according to re-

In most cases, the cut will be made in pay-ments due in the last quarter of the state's fis-cal year (July through September). Some school districts, however, are due for no more aid this year and will have to absorb the cut in the first quarter of the next fiscal year.
