judgment on vital state programs," said Vagnozzi, a delegate to the 1982 Democratic National Convention and a member of the Farmington District school board from 1989-1993.  
"The legislature must share the blame for this because of their penchant to promise more than they deliver and to offer simplistic solutions that sound good to voters but don't work," Brotherton cited legislative progress

in the areas of workers compensation reform, welfare reform, economic development that is making Michigan more attractive to business.  
"Vagnozzi sees property tax reform as "an issue over which the legislature has lost credibility."  
"We are not going to get property tax reform until we come up with an overall tax package that also addresses inequities in individual taxes, small business taxes and the relationship between taxes paid by business and by in-

dividuals," he said.  
"Lost in the loose talk about Michigan's business climate is the fact that business is currently paying about half the percentage of taxes it paid several years ago."  
Brotherton, who serves on the House

Committee on Economic Development and Energy, City Government, Urban Affairs and Public Health, concedes reforms are needed in the Single Business Tax and property taxes — "items that are high on the public's agenda."

When money is counted, more than one person must be present and checks to suppliers require two signatures to be valid. And an audit will be done again following this year's festivities.

Corey said later that teachers in suburban districts were adequately paid and that it was inner city and rural educators who suffered when it came to pay scales.

Corey, a businessman, also took issue with the other candidates, asking why all the other candidates had education backgrounds and he was the only business person.  
"The house is stacked with educators. Where are the citizens? I don't understand this," he said.
