ARK warns pet owners

Summertime can be a fateful time for pets who are taken for rides with their owners, according to animal lovers who are members of ARK, Inc. The humane education service takes its name from the words "action, respect and kindness."

Never, the experts say, should a pet be left in a car with windows up, even if the windows are cracked open. The temperature in the car can reach 102 degrees and the pet can die of heat stroke or suffocation. Not even cars

parked in the shade are acceptable and not even "just for a few minutes."

Those who wish to educate others to such dangers can write to ARK, Box 65, Warren, MI 48090. For a donation of any amount, the organization will send a small quantity of cards which can be given to a driver who has left his or her pet subject to heatstroke.

Jewish Family Service lists new leadership

Jewish Family Service and Resettlement elected new officers and heard several speakers discuss economic conditions at a recent meeting.

Arlene Goldberg, casework supervisor, and Annette Beckek and Aviva Sandler, clinical caseworkers and group therapists, described the impact of cuts in federal programs on agency clients.

The panel also discussed how cuts in educational loans have kept some youth from going to college and how college graduates must compete with the unemployed for a limited number of jobs.

Panelists noted that many young adults are not able to establish independent households and divorced heads of families with children are frequently moving back into their homes.

Economic problems are resulting in more spouse abuse, more substance abuse and psychological depression, panelists said, and they noted that the single parent family and persons new to the job market are among the hardest hit.

State Senator Douglas Ross also discussed economic stress as it impacts on families.

Board members elected were: Susan Alterman, Elise Denner, Walter Klein, Sally Krugel, Phyllis Stern, George Tarooff, Ruth Wayne, Ellen Alter, Frank Charlipaki and Milton Y. Zusman.

Samuel Lerner, executive director of the agencies, reported that 3,983 families were served in 1981, 1,276 of them aging cases and 30 children were in foster or residential placement.
