Developing: a new rose takes time

In deference to our many rose specialists, let's talk about that popular flower. Jackson and Perkins have announced their Rose of the Year. The hybrid tea is Cerise. The specimen has a high center and a rich cerise flowering.

The floribunda (flowers constantly) is lemon yellow and has its parentage from Sunsprite as hybridized by William Warriner, No. 74-2681, no name yet. Both of these are waiting for their patent papers.

It generally takes 10 years from the time a seedling in an experimental greenhouse shows promise until it is ready for the public. It is just like the introduction of a new automobile. Here's a repeater. Be sure and get photographs of the four sides of your house for insurance purposes and keep them in your insurance file. Landscap-ing can add up to 30 percent of your home valuation when done in good taste. Fire and tornadoes can change your home valuation. your home valuation.

If you have hedges with flowers, you should do your major trimming of forsythis and the like before the 1983 buds form in late summer. Trim a hedge after six inches of new growth. It should be narrower at the top to allow sun to enter for natural growth so the total hedge wort thin out.

If you have a white European birch, it should have three sprayings to control the borer. The first should be right now and two more at three-week intervals. Use Lindane.

If you have a rhododendron and it is through flowering, take your thumb and first finger and pinch out the old flower. Do it gingerly as this tip will determine the future growth and flowering of the branch. As for lilacs, you can prune off the spent flowers with clippers.

MUMS NEED their tips pinched off (when the branches are four to six inch-es) until the end of the first week in July so the bush will plump, and you will have an abundance of flowers. This is a good time to get most of your house plants out for the summer.

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
