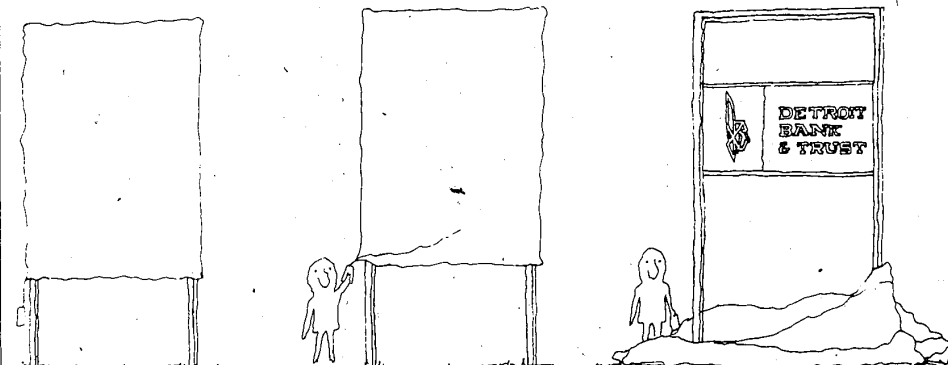
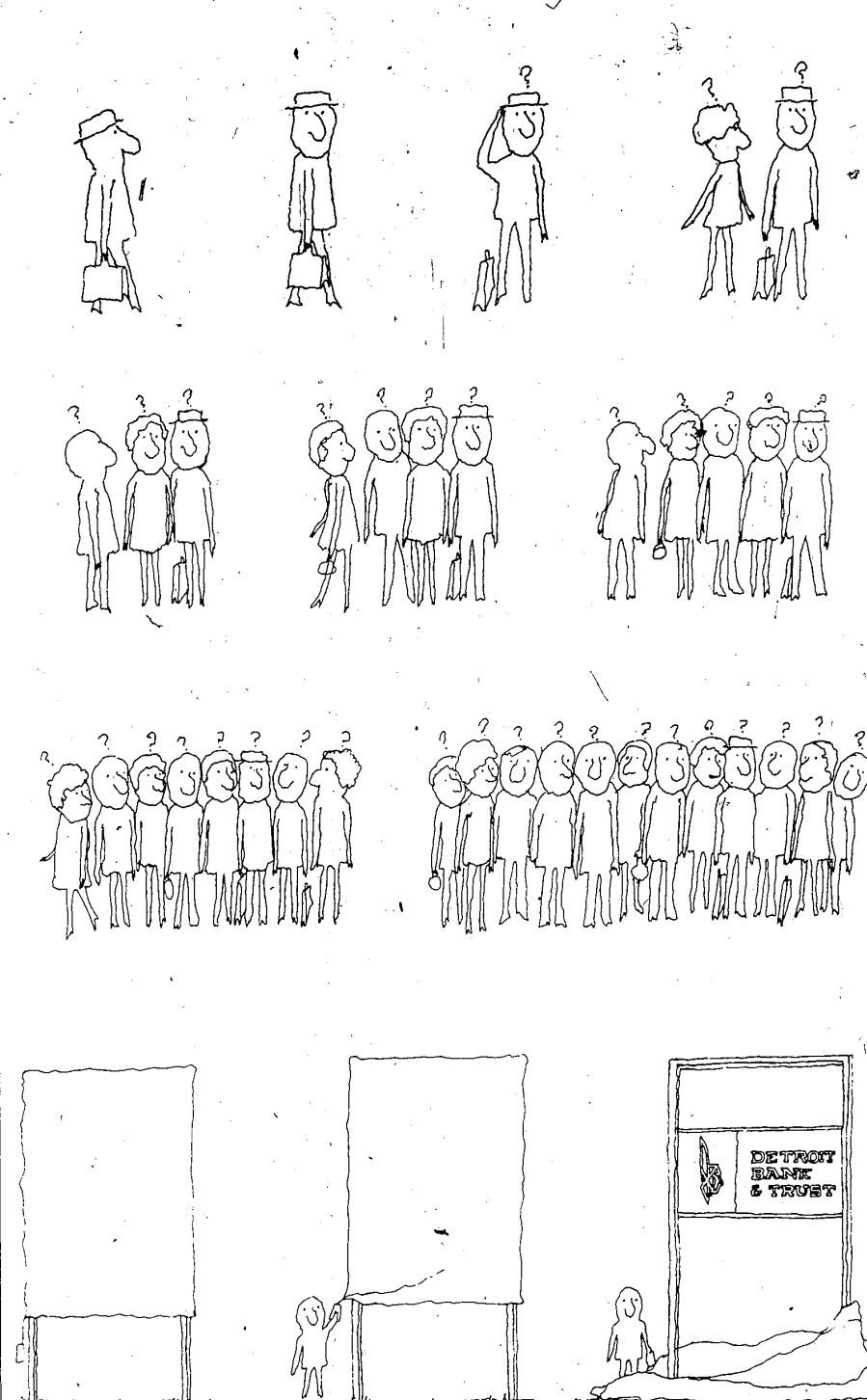
beyond this impact into possible areas of direct action and commitment, the audience divided into groups representing school, business and industry, church and civic, professional and social work.

Irish-born architect James Hoban was awarded \$500 in a competition for designing the White House. President Washington chose the site which was included on Pierre L'Enfant's plan for the Federal City. President John Adams was the first president to enter the White House. Mrs. Adams hung her washing in the uncompleted East Room. In 1948 President Truman had Congress authorize complete rebuilding because the White House was unsafe. Mrs. John Kennedy supervised the complete refurbishing of the presidential residence.
