

Marygrove Installs New Head

The installation of Dr. Arthur Wayne Brown as fourth president of Marygrove College will be held at 11 a.m. Wednesday, April 8, on the campus.

Father Timothy Healy, vice chancellor for academic affairs at City College of New York, will be the main speaker. He is former executive vice president of Fordham University where Dr. Brown was academic vice president prior to coming to Marygrove.

Frank R. Gerbig Jr., chairman of the Marygrove board of trustees, will deliver the charge to Dr. Brown. More than 700 delegates and guests from Michigan colleges and international learned societies, alumnae and friends of the college will attend the inaugural luncheon.

A 6,000 guest reception will be held in the evening honoring Dr. and Mrs. Brown.

Father Kean Cronin, vicar for the college vicariate, will deliver the invocation and the Rev. Hubert Locke, director of religious affairs at Wayne State University, will give the benediction.

Dr. Brown is a former president of Adelphi University, a graduate of University of Scranton and Cornell University. He has a doctor of philosophy degree from Syracuse University and received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the University of Scranton in 1965 and an honorary Doctor of Science degree from Hofstra University in 1966.

He took office as president of Marygrove Sept. 1, 1969.

When you want to know how things used to be in Plymouth, you ask Miss Lovene Sly.

"It's not that I'm an expert at all," she's quick to point out. "But I know who to ask."

Nevertheless, this vital sepiagenarian has more stored knowledge, more fascinating remembrances, more possessions with a history, more interests than almost anyone you could name.

Plymouth history and the Plymouth Historical Society. Family history. Gardening. Conservation. Antiques. National League hockey. These are just a few of the topics that could be taken up in detail by this busy woman.

HER ROOTS go far back into the pioneer history of this area. To Grandpa Silas Sly, who was a farmer at early as 1827 in the area that is now Six Mile and Beek.

Grandpa Nathan and Miss Sly's father, another Silas, followed him as farmers. They raised sheep and cattle and grew vegetables.

"Grandpa used to drive stock all the way down to the Eastern Market," she recalled. "It was a long two-day trip."

"I remember once my sister and I went with him, riding on a carriage with a load of cabbage. We made it one day, and we stayed at the Tibbets Hotel down there near the stockyards. That place was full of bedbugs."

"I just made the trip once, and when we came home we took the trolley to Redford and stayed two weeks with some relatives."

The Sly farm, this family member related, was a big one with 25 buildings at one time—granaries, horse barns, cow barns and slaughterhouses. Her father, she added, was strictly a farmer who never succeeded in learning to drive a car.

Academy Shows Tie-Die Panel By J. Hudson

"Sunrise-Sunset," a brilliantly-hued panel of tie-dyed fabric by Mrs. Sam Hudson of Plymouth, will be on display until April 4 in the Community Arts Gallery of Wayne State University.

The work is part of an exhibition of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters.

Mrs. Hudson said the panel is 6 1/2 feet long and is done mainly in oranges and yellows "with black that gives it an Oriental look."

Jessie Hudson, well known artist in this area, has concentrated her attention recently on tie-dying and batik, a method of using wax in dyeing materials. She has demonstrated the technique for the Plymouth Study Club.

In this area, her work is on display in the Northville Post Office, the Old Mill Restaurant in Northville, the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth, the Hartley Gallery in Northville and in her studio on North Territorial Road, Plymouth.

Women on the Go Lady Of Many Interests --Plymouth's Miss Sly

"He tried, but he never learned to use the brakes," she chuckled. "The things wouldn't 'whoa' and 'giddyup'."

LOVERNE SLY worked 20 years in the Wayne County Training School as an attendant and later 11 years as a psychiatric aide in the Wayne County general hospital, retiring in 1961.

"I went there in 1936, during the depression, and was very glad to have the work," she said.

She recalled some interesting experiences with the patients at the two institutions.

"I taught an art class with some of the kids once, and it was the first time that boys and girls had been together in a class. I didn't know much

about art, but I took lessons and then came back to teach."

Now retired, Miss Sly devotes long hours in the summer to creating a beauty garden spot behind her small home at 1076 Hartsough.

An avid soil conservationist, she gives careful attention to a compost heap to improve growing conditions on her lot.

She also is glad to display her collection of antiques and garnered from family possessions and on many trips in Canada - and spends hours delving through old volumes of "The Plymouth Mail" for items of interest about long-gone members of her family.

EVENINGS in the winter see Loverne Sly as one of hockey's most avid fans.

She keeps detailed records of all televised performances of the Red Wings and other NHL teams, and can do a pretty accurate demonstration of the skating styles of many players.

And she promotes the Plymouth Historical Society - it's a subject very close to her heart.

"There's so much of historic interest here," she says. "And a lot of the information we must get catalogued while we have these old-time residents with us."

Miss Sly is delighted by the moves toward a new building for the Historical Society, but points out that when it is ready "We will have to have more residents of the community taking an interest."

"So many young people and organizations come to see our displays and files for reports," she said. "We give them the information and we're glad to - but we need their help too."

"We need people who can type and someone with a tape recorder and all kinds of service to preserve the memories of Plymouth."

MISS SLY said pictorial histories of Plymouth are on sale in city and township stores and other spots in Plymouth - and it will be a help to the future museum if they can be sold at more than the present rate of 12 or so a month.
