Fight summer blues at library

As the summer continues, and the kids begin to get bored with so much time and so little to do, why not consider the library? Several programs, geared to all ages, will be held this month.

The summer reading club, Camp-Wanna-Read-A-Book, is now in full swing at both branches. Children who can read are invited to join; readers must read books on their own reading level or above and orally report to librarians to earn credit for books read. T-shirt transfers, Burger King certificates and reading certificates are all awarded for certain numbers of items read. See a children's librarian for details.

In conjunction with the Camp-Wanna-Read-A-Book theme, several programs open to all elementary-age children will be offered, each centered around an aspect of camp. The first of these will be "At the Bunkhouse," to be held at the Farmington Branch on Thursday, July 1, 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.; which will feature a ghost story and treasure hunt, with a comic swap to follow. Bring comics you'd like to trade. "In the Mess Hall," which will showcase films with a culinary theme, will be offered on Wednesday, July 7, 2-3 p.m. at the Farmington Branch, and on Friday, July 9, 11 a.m. to noon at the Farmington Hills Branch. "At the Waterfront," screenings of "Paddle to the Sea," "Robinson's Island," and "The Little Mermaid," will be shown at the Farmington Hills Library on Monday, July 12 2-3:15 p.m. and on Thursday, July 15, 11 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. at the Farmington Branch.

A special presentation, "In the Woods," will feature a speaker from the Kensington Nature Center, who will show a film on metropolitan wildlife, and discuss animals common to this area. "In the Woods" will be offered at the Farmington Branch only, Wednesday, July 21 2-3 p.m.

Participants are asked to bring a medium-sized glass jar with lid to "In the Crafts Cabin," which will feature a camp craft activity. Reservations are requested; call the Farmington Branch at 474-7770 for the Tuesday, July 20, 11 a.m. to noon program or the Farmington Hills Branch at 553-0300 for the Monday, July 26, 2-3 p.m. program.
A separate series has been planned for preschoolers, ages 2-5. These 30-minute programs feature films, stories, activities, and songs, geared to the limited attention span of this age group. These include "Disney Delights," a col-

lection of Disney films to be shown at the Farmington Hills Branch on Friday, July 2, 11:11-11:30 a.m.; "Animal Antics," films and creative dramatics activities at the Farmington Hills Branch on Tuesday, July 6, 2-2:30 p.m. and at the Farmington Branch on Thursday, July 8, 11:11-11:30 a.m.; and "Famous Story Songs," songs on film, at the Farmington Hills Branch on Tuesday, July 13, 11:11-11:30 a.m. and at the Farmington Branch on Wednesday, July 14, 2-2:30 p.m. "Indian Lore and Legend" will be offered on Thursday, July 22, 11:11-11:30 a.m. at the Farmington Branch, and on Friday, July 23, 2-2:30 p.m. at the Farmington Hills Branch. Participants are asked to bring two large leaves and a large twig for the parent-child craft activity, "Wood you leaf me along?" to be offered at the Farmington Hills Branch on Wednesday, July 28, 11:11-11:30 a.m. and at the Farmington Branch on Friday, July 30, 2-2:30 p.m.

It's YOUR Money

HOW TO CUT THE HIGH COST OF DRIVING
Are there ways to save on gas? Yes. Don't raise the engine when starting. Don't make jackrabbit getaways or accelerate too fast. Anticipate stops or slowdowns by easing up on the gas pedal instead of braking at the last moment. Use the right gas: high test won't improve performance nor will regular save money if used contrary to your manual's recommendations. Driving at 70 to 80 m.p.h. uses up 50 percent more gas than 50 m.p.h., and is hard on oil, too. In bad weather, slower driving saves gas and prevents accidents.
Can you make your tires last longer? Remember, radial tires offer the longest mileage — and save on gas, too. Check them regularly — about every two weeks — and maintain recommended pressures. Underinflation or overinflation may cause uneven wear, weaken sidewalls, induce blowouts. Examine treads for glass, stones, etc. Avoid scraping, bumping, bruising. High speeds and sudden stops punish tires. At 70 they wear out twice as fast as at 45. Keep wheels properly aligned and balanced to prevent uneven wear.
What about brakes? Have them checked regularly for undue wear on lining and drums, for loss of cylinder fluid, for too much play in pedal. Avoid sudden stops except in emergencies. Use low gears for long downhill runs.
Any money-saving tips on the owner's manual? It's loaded with them. For example, regular tune-ups can save plenty of gasoline as well as pep up your car; cleaning and oiling battery terminals can keep your battery going longer. More-frequent-than-required oil changes protect your engine. The biggest money-saver of all: Follow the maintenance schedule it recommends and add a year or two to the life of your car.
