

Businesses prosper

lege fund and patriotism as other reasons for the increase.

Equipment rental companies are also experiencing increased business. "The rental industry, as a rule, has picked up over recent years," said Rob Weingrot, manager of United Rental in Farmington. "A service-oriented business is not likely to suffer when there is a poor economy," he said.

A higher demand than ever before for party equipment is what Weingrot is noticing. He explained, "People are throwing their own parties now instead of having them catered in halls."

"We get a lot of homeowners who come in trying to save money by doing things themselves," said Ken Olson, manager of Art's Rental Service, in Farmington. Olson, however, said his business has picked up only in recent months, rather than recent years. Farmington auto parts stores are doing better in recent years due mainly to consumer efforts to save money.

People are keeping their older cars instead of buying new ones, said Glenade Auto Supply manager Mike Beley. "As a result, retail sales are up," he said.

"All lines, all products are selling

well," said Dave Sadoway, vice-president and general manager of Steedman Auto Supply. The state of the economy and good service are reasons, said Sadoway, for the increased business.

Contrary to what people might think, all employment agencies are not reaping a harvest from unemployment. "Placement figures are down from last year," said Larry Latham, president of Latham Schultz and Associates, Inc. His organization specializes in permanent placement of data processors and engineers.

"Although many people are looking for work, there are fewer jobs available. And the people in demand don't always tend to be the people laid-off," he said.

Temporary placement services, on the other hand, are doing well, according to Latham. "This is simply because there's no long-term commitments or fringe benefits associated with short-term employment," he explained.

City Clerk Floyd Cairns said, "A multitude of businesses in the Industrial Park are doing very well. Several are prospering and others are holding their own." He mentioned Holiday Inn and Red Roof Inn as doing very well. "So, too, is the computer industry," said Cairns.

How parents get tough

rights to live a peaceful and productive life, to have a good night's sleep.

Using the manual, "Toughlove," parents assess their crises by taking a quiz. The results are kept confidential.

Parents learn to make changes, to get beyond denial, depression and dependence to interdependence — helping others and being helped themselves. They establish a "true and meaningful community."

The manual urges parents in crisis to "stop. Sit Down. Relax." Concentration on deep breathing helps accomplish the relaxation. They then think about how they have been reacting to their child's out-of-control behavior and vow to change their own reactions to more productive responses.

Toughlove parents learn to take a stand. The steps include:

- Finding bottom lines. Parents make a list of their child's upsetting incidents of the past six months. They circle those incidents they wish to never deal with again. These are their "bottom lines."

- Setting a structure. Making a list of specific rules with "I will not" statements such as "I will not pay my teenager's fines," or "I will not tolerate violence in my home."

- Allowing their teenager to experience consequences: Lose car privileges for breaking curfew, for example. Allow him to pay his own fine for a traffic violation.

Toughlove parents support each other. Many exchange telephone numbers to get or give moral support when a crisis arises. They may offer to be surrogate parents at a given time, when the natural parents are too emotionally involved to be effective.
