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officials said.

WILLING TO DO battle for their causes, the Gray Panthers protest wherever they see the need. Verbally they take on Health and Human Services officials, nursing home administrators, American Medical Association directors, congressmen, utility spokesmen, media managers, corporation executives and anyone else they deem as standing in the way of "justice, freedom, and dignity for... the powerless."

Rosinger became active in the group in 1978 after she took early retirement

at age 62. "We are interested in many social issues, both national and grass roots," said Rosinger. "One of our primary concerns is for a fair federal budget. Money that is desperately needed for human services — human survival — is being spent on nuclear weapons."

"As Grace Wartfield pointed out, 'If we had spent \$1 million every day since the birth of Christ, we would have spent only half of what the Reagan administration wants to spend in the next five years.'"

"Other issues we endorse," continued Rosinger, "are: affordable health care, viable Social Security, decent housing

for everyone. "We seek coalitions with other groups. For example, here in Michigan, we try to help the Michigan Coalition on Utilities and Energy. We're in favor of the advisory referendum for electing five members to the Public Service Commission. We don't like the present system of having three government-appointed members, of which only one is a consumer spokesperson."

"WE DON'T" endorse political candidates nor parties," Rosinger said. "We work in issues. What other things are we for? We're for peace, through mediation. We're for ERA, women's rights and the Pro-Choice concept."

"We are against the military draft as well as nuclear weapons. We work against 'age-ism,' 'sex-ism,' racism and any other form of discrimination. We

are against prayer in public schools. "You might call us humanists. We want society more humane."

On Saturday, workshops were held for Gray Panther members only. These were closed to the general public. Morning workshops included: improving interpersonal communication, implementing Gray Panther philosophy, coalition-building, and sparking activism.

After lunch, Wilbur Cohen, former secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, spoke on "Social Security: An Intergenerational Issue." Workshops followed on nursing, peace and health.

Reading material was abundant, from the "Age Page" with health advice for the elderly to war-resistance pamphlets.

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the city's tax base is concerned, it means quite a bit," said Farmington Hills City Clerk Floyd Cairns.

"They intend to build more buildings and more facilities as time goes on. They're a No. 1 company."

Robert McConnell, EDC president, views the deal as a satisfying victory, since the Farmington Hills site was in stiff competition with others in Chicago and Charlotte, N.C.

"Bosch probably will employ 50-100 people and create a spin-off for supplier companies. This will be a big feature in the profile of our community. It's kind of a perfect marriage," McConnell said.

The fact that Robert Bosch is a foreign interest conducting 85 percent of

its research and development in Germany matters little to the EDC.

"We look at the caliber of company and the potential for growth in terms of tax base and employment."

"Bosch is one of the largest suppliers to the automotive industry. As I look at the business world today, I see it becoming more and more a world market, where nationality doesn't enter into it anymore. It's a highly sophisticated business they're in, and it'll be an international complex once they expand," added McConnell, president of Troy's MCP Sales Inc.

Robert Bosch will join 140 foreign firms and 35 West German firms currently operating in Michigan. Eight corporations, including Bosch, were lured to Michigan during 1981.

For taxpayers convenience, a night depository, located on the east wall of the front courtyard, is available for after hours tax payments. Also, tax payments may be made at any National Bank of Detroit. They will accept tax payments until 3:00 p.m., August 31, 1982.

Whether you pay your taxes in person, through the mail, or by night depository, be sure to return BOTH COPIES of the tax bill.

Applications for deferment of 1982 taxes will be available at the City of Farmington Hills Treasurer's Office. If your income for 1981 did not exceed \$10,000 and you are a paraplegic, quadriplegic, senior citizen, eligible serviceman, eligible veteran, eligible widow, blind or totally or permanently disabled, your application must be filed with the City of Farmington Hills Treasurer's Office no later than September 15, 1982. The City of Farmington Hills will be payable along with winter taxes no later than Monday, February 14, 1983.

By law, PAYMENTS BY MAIL are recorded by the Treasurer on the date actually received. Payments received after August 31, 1982, will be returned with added penalty.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING
June 28, 1982

Mayor Pro-Tem Lange opened the regular meeting of the City Council of Farmington Hills on June 28, 1982, at 7:21 P.M. Members present were: Dolin, Hughes, Soronen, Wolf and Lange. Absent were: Williams and Burwell. Others present were: City Manager Savage, Assistant City Manager Costick, City Clerk Cairns, Director of Public Services Binzell and City Attorney Blouan.

The agenda was approved with the addition of item 8d. Consideration of Plat Approval for Farmington Hills IRO Park North.

The minutes of June 7, June 14 and June 21, 1982 were approved as published.

Council adopted Zoning Map Amendment C62-282 to remove south side of Thirteen Mile Road, between Middlebelt and Davis Lane from RA-1A to RA-1B.

Council adjourned Enactment of Zoning Map Amendment C62-282 to rezone 38285 Twelve Mile Road from RA-1 to OS-1 to July 12, 1982.

Council enacted Ordinance C-9-82 establishing standards for the designation of Natural Beauty Roads. (Part II, Chapter 10, Article VII of City Code).

Council adopted petition and designation guidelines for Natural Beauty Roads.

Council appointed Mayor Burwell a voting delegate to the Michigan Municipal League and Mr. Wolf was chosen an alternate delegate.

No action was taken by Council on the request of Mr. Jay Cook, for the reconsideration of building demolition order.

Council set July 26, 1982, as the Public Hearing date for designation of Howard Road as a Natural Beauty Road.

Council granted a one year extension to the sidewalk requirement on Twelve Mile Road for William Tyndale College.

Council approved an executive session following the regular meeting to discuss pending litigation.

Council approved Farmington Hills IRO Park North Plat, subject to Engineering approval, approval of deed restrictions and fees that are required by the Engineering Department; also subject to execution of agreement for storm water retention basin.

A report was received by Council regarding the drainage problem in Section 26.

Council directed Administration to draft policies for construction of sidewalk.

Council authorized City Manager to apply for the Community Energy Management state and federal assistance.

Council tabled a decision relative to "Children Playing" warning signs in the proximity of 21352 Birchwood until the next regular meeting.

Council adopted a resolution amending the 1981-82 budget.

Council established a Public Hearing on July 6, 1982, to review the Special Assessment Roll of the Grand River Sidewalk Project.

Council authorized the notification of property owners relative to repairs or replacements under the 1982 Sidewalk Program.
