Although the housing industry remains in a slump, and construction and sales of commercial, office and instantial properties ag, Oakland Couptain and the sales of the sales are traing.

Values climbed 13 percent since 1880 and 35 percent since 1978, according to the Oakland County Planning Division's published 1981 report.

Commercial and industrial real estate increased 7 percent and 12 percent respectively since 1980, the planners found.

Over all, non-residential construction in the county was down 20 percent in 1881 and 50 percent from 1979. Industrial permits fell 30 percent in 1981 and 60 percent since 1979. Commercial building permits issued in 1981 declined nearly 15 percent from 1894 and 97 percent since 1979, the re-

RESIDENTIAL building overall was low during 1981. Only 1,887 permits were issued throughout the county last year — a 55-percent decline from 1980's 4,183 permits and a 72-percent drop since 1978, when 10,279 permits were issued.

Approximately two-thirds of residental building permits issued in the county were from eight communities: Southfield (205,) Avon Township (199). Birmingham (194), West Bloomfield (159), Novi (149), Bloomfield Township (126), Farmington Hills (109) and Troy (85).

From a broader perspective, Oakland County continues to be the largest provider of new single-family housing in the immediate six-county area, attracting more than 40 percent of the regional to

AVERAGE SELLING selling price of all residential dwellings, both new and used in Oakland County, was \$72,890. That figure is based on a total of 9,035 units sold in 1931.

Bloomfield Township, West Bloomfield and Southfield have established some of the highest av-

erage selling prices in the county, the planners re-

ported.

Oakland's future developments appear to be around Novi and in Troy and more northern areas along 1-75. While the number of platted subdivisions is down drastically, these areas appear to have the largest numbers of plats available, ready for development.

In 1981 only 44 plats were recorded, down 56 percent from the previous year's 101 plats and down 65 percent from the 124 plats recorded in 1978. As a result, 4,476 fewer lots were created from platted subdivisions than in 1979.

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
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
