Beware of the Invasion of the Spores!

"Invasion of the Spores" sounds like the title of a science-fiction movie. Picture microscopic creatures descending on all kinds of things and proceeding to munch away at them. It goes on all the time — you know the results as mildew. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, if you understand what causes these blotchy, musty smelling stains on furniture and other objects, you'll be better able to deal with the problem. For a copy of "How to Prevent and Remove Mildew," send \$1.50 to the Consumer Information Center, Department J, Pueblo, Colo., 81009. Mildew is a living thing — a mold — that reproduces itself by a microscopic airborne spore. It needs to eat — and one of the items in its diet is almost any kind of soil or greasy film. So to fight mildew, keep things clean. Mildew tends to shrink from sunlight and fresh air. It does its festering in the dark and damp. If you're getting mildew in your basement, you should repair cracked or

damaged foundation walls that are letting the dampness in. If the problem is a lot of moisture in the air, a dehumidifier can help. You can improve the situation in dry closets by keeping the doors open and by keeping clothes separated so air gets a chance to circulate around them. If something gets mildewed, attack the problem immediately so it doesn't spread. Brush off whatever mildew you can outdoors so the spores don't spread around the house. Then clean the item as you normally would. Give the item a thorough sunning and airing. For mildew on surfaces like bathroom tile, liquid chlorine bleach works well. Use a dilute solution of a cup of bleach a gallon of water, wipe the area as dry as you can and leave the windows open until thoroughly dried. The booklet contains specific instruction for removing mildew from a variety of other surfaces. When you order, you will also receive a free copy of the "Consumer Information Catalog."

ORDINANCE NO. C-489-82

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.50, WATER RATES, AND SECTION 2.84, SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES, OF CHAPTER 20, WATER AND SEWER RATES, OF TITLE II OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

2.52. Water Rates. The rates to be charged for water service shall be as follows:

QUARTERLY BILLING CHARGE:

First 6,000 gallons or less \$7.04
Over 6,000 gallons .88 per 1,000 gallons used

BI-MONTHLY BILLING CHARGE:

First 4,000 gallons or less \$4.70
Over 4,000 gallons .88 per 1,000 gallons used

Minimum Quarterly water charge to each premise shall be: \$7.04
Minimum Bi-Monthly water charge to each premise shall be: \$4.70

Charges for water service to premises outside the City shall be fixed by the Council, but shall not be less than those charged for such service to premises within the City.

2.84. Sewage Disposal Service Rates. Charges for sewage disposal service to each premise within the City connected with the sewage disposal system, for each quarterly or bi-monthly period, shall be one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the water charges to such premises for such period. Charges for sewage disposal service furnished to premises outside the City shall be fixed by the Council but shall not be less than those charged for such service to premises within the City.

If the character of sewage from any manufacturing or industrial plant, or from any building or premise, is such that it imposes an unreasonable burden upon the sewage disposal system of the City or any other sewage disposal system through which it flows, then an additional charge shall be made over and above the regular rates, or it may be required that such sewage be treated by the person, firm or corporation responsible therefor before being emptied into any public drain or sewer, or the right to so empty said sewage may be denied, if necessary, for the protection of any such sewage disposal system or the public health or safety.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on June 21, 1982, and adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on July 6, 1982, and will become effective for all water and sewage billing after August 1, 1982.
